World News CUT SHORT

LONDON, April 24.—A grant of \$25,000 made to Admiral Nelson after the battle of Trafalgar and extended to his descendants, is still continued, the chancellor of the exchequer told a questioner in the House of Commons.

The grant thus far has cost the government \$3,000,000.

COPENHAGEN, April 24.—A Helmsfors dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company states that the North Mongolian government, in Urga, at the instigation of the Moscow government, has proclaimed Mongolia's independence of China.

The Urga government, says the message, also has concluded a treaty with the Russian Soviet government under which the latter pledges active support to Mongolia in the event of a Chinese invasion.

LONDON, April 24.—Although official statements by the Russian Soviet government have reported Premier Lenin's health satisfactory, he continues to keep away from state affairs, says a Reval dispatch to the London Times.

M. Tsurupoff, who has hitherto acted for Lenin as president of the council of people's commissars, was taken ill on April 8 and has been succeeded by the first vice-president, L. Rykov, who is also assistant president of the council of labor and defence.

BUENOS AIRES, April 24.—Professor George S. Nicolai of the University of Berlin and his party were allowed to Monrovia from the German steamship Kohn last night after having been detained on board since the vessel's arrival from Bremen on Thursday.

The immigration authorities said they desired to investigate reports of advanced ideas in Bolshevik tendencies. Further delay was caused by the fact that the passports held by the members of the party had not been vided by the Argentine consulate in Berlin.

PARIS, April 24.—The wife of Dr. Leblois, a physician living in a beautiful chateau near Angers, was recently found to have forged the number of a lottery ticket in her possession in order to profit by a prize of 500,000 francs, which she hoped to add to her daughter's dowry. When she attempted to cash it at a bank the forgery was of course discovered immediately and a judicial inquiry was opened.

Yesterday the magistrate decided to arrest Mme. Leblois. When she reached her husband he was so distressed that he had to be taken to a hospital, where he died next morning from nervous shock.

CONSTANTINOPLE, April 24.—

Offer \$100,000,000 Loan For Canada Today.

NEW YORK, April 24.—J. P. Morgan & Co. announced late today that it would offer tomorrow a \$100,000,000 government loan for the Dominion of Canada.

The bonds will bear 5 per cent interest and run for a period of 30 years, the Canadian government reserving the right to recall them in 20 years. They will be offered at par and interest.

The proceeds will be used by the Canadian government to refund the existing debt of the Dominion.

A Turkish woman has been given the rank of lieutenant in the Nationalist army, earning her promotion in action against the Greeks, says an Ankara dispatch. This is the highest rank ever held in the Turkish army by a woman.

Fatma, the woman in question, was a corporal when she led a patrol composed almost entirely of women in an attack on the enemy's rear and returned with twenty-five prisoners, including an officer.

BATTALIONS of women were created last year and have shown great bravery and suffered heavy casualties.

BERLIN, April 24.—Anton Lang, the potter of Oberammergau, who plays the role of Christ in the Passion Play and is also chairman of the village council, said today: "We will never consent to having the Passion Play filmed, even if the bids are raised to 100,000,000 marks or more."

WARSAW, April 24.—Gold bars, diamonds and other precious stones valued at 10,000,000 gold rubles, or approximately \$5,000,000, have been received by the Polish government from Soviet Russia instead of the rolling stock due Poland by virtue of the Riga peace treaty of 1921.

This is the second installment, the first payment of gold and precious stones having been made last December.

The shipment came in special cars conveyed by armed guards and upon its arrival in Warsaw the gold and stones were placed in vaults of the Polish government bank.

TO REGISTER FOR ELECTIONS.

WINNIPEG, April 24.—Registration for the provincial general elections will commence May 8, it was officially announced today. Dissolution and election dates will be announced early in May. It is thought that elections will not be possible until about July 10.

EXHIBITS OF WAR PICTURES PLEASE

Official Photographs and Reproductions of Memorial Paintings Shown in London.

ALL CORPS REPRESENTED

Nicholas Wilson Chapter Brings Interesting Collection to City to Aid Children's Hospital.

Much interest has been awakened in London and district in the exhibit of Canadian official war photographs and reproductions of war memorial paintings, "a photographic history of Canada in the war," which will be on view this week, commencing Wednesday, in the former Nordheimer store on Dundas street, two doors west of the Majestic Theatre.

It is said that this Canadian war memorial collection of photographs and colored reproductions of paintings constitute unquestionably the most interesting record of any country's share in the great war. More than 1,000 photographs have been selected from a collection of 5,000, taken by expert photographers of the war office, hence, each and every one bears the stamp of authenticity.

A wonderful life is presented to the eye of the life of Canadian soldiers, beginning when the Canadians arrived in France in 1915, and continuing to the finish of 1918 from Ypres to the Rhine.

Practically the whole activity of Canada in the war is thus covered, field, navy and flying corps. Wherever they are shown they make a special appeal to ex-service men and their families, nurses, and those who were vitally, personally interested in Canada's part in the great conflict.

The exhibition has been brought here under the auspices of the War Memorial Children's Hospital committee, with the Nicholas Wilson (educational) Chapter logically assuming the responsibility of the conveyance.

The hospital will reap the benefit of a percentage on the sale of the photographs and reproductions, as well as otherwise through the exhibition.

TO LOWER PRICE OF MILK

Hamilton Producers' Association and Distributors Agree on Reduction.

HAMILTON, April 24.—The Milk Producers' Association and the distributors have agreed to a reduction in the price of milk from \$2.67 to \$2.17, which will bring the retail price down from 13 cents to 11 cents a quart. The price of ice cream has been reduced to \$1.45 a gallon, a cut of 8 cents, and the 5-cent dish of ice cream is in sight again.
