## OFFICIALS THINK LONDON SCHOOLS GOT WRONG BOOKS

Shipment of Histories Intended For U. S. Consumption Sent to Canada by Error.

## WILL PROBE ERROR

An investigation as to how students at the Collegiate Institute of London and other centers in the province of Ontario came to be supplied with textbooks of American origin, and purporting to be a history for the school, is being undertaken, according to information received today.

The books, which are written by two American authors, J. H. Robinson and Charles Beard, are not suitable for study in Canadian schools, in that many references are made to United States history, while comparatively little is said about Canada, and particularly Canada's part in the great war.

Local dealers, who supplied the books to the students, are investigating the matter with the educationalists of the city, and the Cope Clark Company, Toronto, will be asked to explain why the books were sent out.

The opinion seems to be that two books were written, one for American and the other for Canadian consumption, and that the firm in the States, from whom Cope Clark Company purchased the books, mixed the orders and sent that used in the American schools.

One prominent educationalist expressed the opinion that such had been the case. He also said that he was not worrying as the teaching of history successfully depended on the interpretation of the subject given by the teachers and he was sure that the teachers of London instilling were of such standing that no harm would result.

It was more to the casual reader that the books were harmful. These people would take the printed word for the truth and thus receive a wrong conception of the history.

It is also stated that J. H. Robinson, co-author of the book is strongly pro-British, having been noted for these sentiments during the war, when his views on the subject of British aid in arguments and matters of discussion.

## SARNIA MAN DENIES SEDUCTION CHARGE

Case Brought by Peter Lumley Against James Coulter Last On List.

Sarnia, Sept. 28.—The last case on the jury list of the Lambton assizes was that of Peter Lumley, against Edward, who seeks damages from James Coulter of Sarnia for the alleged seduction of his daughter, Flossie Lumley, and was continued at this afternoon's sittings of the supreme court assizes here. W. S. Haney is counsel for the plaintiff and A. Weir, K.C., is acting for the defendant.

Flossie Lumley, the alleged victim of the seduction, was the first witness called by the plaintiff. She testified that she first met defendant at the social club in Sarnia in February, 1922, at a Valentine party. He accompanied her home on that occasion, and after that date he made several visits to her home. A child was born February 28.

Defendant made a total denial of the charges.

Ross Hamilton (Marjorie) of the Dumbell Theatre Company forwarded \$6 costs from Chatham for driving his automobile past a standing street car in Sarnia during his visit early in the week.

ASK GOVERNMENT AID IN SHIPPING PROBLEM

Urgent Appeal Addressed To Minister by Winnipeg Board.

Winnipeg, Sept. 28.—An urgent appeal for government action to solve the shipping problem has been addressed to the minister of trade and commerce by the Winnipeg Board of Trade, the Canadian Credit Men's Association, and the Manitoba Board of the Retail Merchants' Association of Canada. The appeal was wired to Ottawa today.

The government is urged to take whatever steps may be necessary to provide sufficient tonnage for the grain movement. The shortage of United States tonnage is ascribed to the effect of the inland freight rates act passed last session.

The appeal points out that if a blockade is not avoided at the head of the lakes, not only would the producer be affected by lower grain prices, but that every business in the Dominion would be seriously injured.

## Three New Business Laws To Become Effective Oct. 1

Ottawa, Sept. 28.—Monday next, October 1, is the date chosen for the Dominion government to bring into force three pieces of legislation which closely affect the business world, one of them particularly touching the average citizen.

The three laws referred to are the amendments made last session to the bank act, the revision of the bankruptcy act, and the withdrawal of the privilege of using postage stamps for the payment of most taxes under the war revenue act.

The new bank act, as far as it concerns the larger number of its provisions, went into force upon July 1, but three vital sections do not become effective until the first day of next month. These three sections have to do with the monthly returns made by the banks to the department of finance, and with the new penalties for making false or deceptive statements regarding the condition of the banks. The outstanding change made by these sections with

their related schedules is that the officers of the bank making the statements, must in future take an oath that full provision has been made for bad and doubtful debts in the valuation of current loans and discounts.

The revised bankruptcy act introduces a system for the administration of insolvent estates analogous to that in force in Great Britain and the United States. By this new system, administration of such estates is to be effected by means of trustees appointed by the creditors, instead of as heretofore, by authorized trustees, generally selected by the insolvent debtor.

The third new piece of legislation which comes into effect on Monday will require the public to use inland revenue stamps on checks and on most other documents taxable under the special war revenue act. Postage stamps may, however, still be used upon post office money orders.

Special arrangements have been made regarding the tax upon postal notes.
