be given. Colonel Graham listened to the sentence of the court, standing a few feet in front of the magistrate alone, with complete composure. Following the sentence he walked from the court room to a private office adjoining. First Called. The case was the first to be called police court this morning. Colonel Graham elected summary trial, and when asked to enter a plea stated: I am guilty of the charges, sir. "I cannot take any qualified plea," the court answered, Jared Vining

Crown Attorney Albert M. Juda asked if it was necessary to acquaint the court with facts of the case, and Magistrate Graydon replied that this would be unnecessary. Before the crown attorney moved the sentence of the court, Jared Vining spoke in favor of the accused. He declared that there was a possibility that the service Colonel Graham performed during the war had so affected his mental capacity that it made it possible for him to make a misuse of

Crown Attorney Judd stated that he received this morning a marked check in full restitution for the amount of shortages detected in the division court accounts.


