

TWO ARE CHARGED IN COMBER CRASH

Herbert Craven of Delhi and E. A. Lalonde, Toronto, Summoned.

Windsor, Aug. 23.—Charges of criminal negligence have been placed against Herbert Craven, 37 years old, of Delhi, and Edwin A. Lalonde, 40, of Toronto, drivers of the automobile that collided on the Comber road, near Tilbury, Friday night, killing three persons. Craven's father and mother and his aunt were killed, and four others were injured. The charge against Craven is made by S. A. Hilliard, a provincial highway officer, who said such action is necessary to ensure the presence of the two men at the inquest, which has been called for August 28, at Stoney Point. Craven and Lalonde are both in Hotel Dieu here, recovering from their injuries.

Physicians tonight express the belief that Mrs. Albert McCall, 58, of No. 5 Rutherford avenue, Hamilton, Craven's aunt, who was believed dying when brought to the hospital, has a chance for life. The bodies of the deceased, Mr. and Mrs. Orlin Craven and Mrs. Sheridan, were taken to Delhi today for burial. Mrs. Sheridan is a practice of that place.

A jury under Dr. Paul Poisson viewed the scene of the accident yesterday, and adjourned until August 28. No eye-witnesses of the accident have yet been located.

The bus was proceeding to the race track, when in order to avoid striking another automobile, the driver turned it onto the track. The street car was in charge of William Baldick, 127 Oak avenue, and Frank Lee, of Essex.

Taylor, 446 Benton street, Detroit, injuries to legs; Fred Warren, 9652 Eravere street, Detroit, cuts on head and arms; Mr. and Mrs. John Crawford, Chicago, Ill., shock and minor cuts, and their nephew, Frank O'Brien, 12 years old, who suffered similar injuries. The driver of the bus was taken to police headquarters, but was released to appear tomorrow.

MRS. JANISSE WILL TALK MAYBE, SAYS COUNSEL

Admitted Slayer of Clayton McMullen To Attend Inquest Tuesday.

Windsor, Aug. 23.—Almost ready to leave the hospital, the self-inflicted bullet wound in her leg having healed, Mrs. Ruth Janisse of LaSalle, who declares she shot and killed Clayton McMullen, Windsor battery service station proprietor, ten days ago, will be in attendance when the inquest is resumed Tuesday night, but will not take the witness stand. James H. Clay, counsel for Mrs. Janisse, is authority for the statement. "They cannot make her talk if she doesn't want to," the lawyer said tonight. Crown Attorney Allan does not believe Mrs. Janisse's appearance is essential, however, as the object of the inquest is to establish the cause of McMullen's death, and this can be done, it is explained, without Mrs. Janisse, also she told police at the time of her arrest that she fired the fatal shot.

INJURIES PROVE FATAL IN CROSSING ACCIDENT

Falls Man Killed—Companion Hurt As Train Hits Car.

Partial Success in Australia Fails To Pervade London Circles.

1,600 HOMELESS

London, Aug. 23.—All was quiet at the London docks today. The unofficial strike of the shipping men has not only made no progress, but apparently is fizzling out. Several vessels, which were temporarily delayed, secured crews and sailed out of port.

The seamen's strike seems, up to the present time, to have been less successful in the home ports than in Australia, where shipping trouble has been long simmering.

The seamen's strike is an unofficial movement, and is understood to be fomented by Tom Walsh, who was closely identified with the shipping strike in Australia. About 15,000 men are involved, the strikers repudiating the agreement between the two seamen's unions and the employers for a reduction of wages.

IDLE AT SYDNEY.

Sydney, Australia, Aug. 23.—Ten British steamers are in port here, their crews totalling 2,000, of whom 1,600 are virtually homeless. The others are allowed to stay aboard their ships pending a settlement of the strike.

CANADA AND U. S. WILL TRADE TIPS

Nations Agree On Exchange of Information On Illicit Traffic.

Washington, Aug. 23.—Regulations for carrying out the anti-smuggling treaty between Canada and the United States were agreed upon Saturday at a final conference between representatives of the two governments, but will not be made public until official signatures are attached. There was no disagreement on any point, it is stated. An important feature relates to the clearance of vessels from Canadian ports bound for the United States. If they are suspected of having liquor or other contraband aboard, the Canadian authorities will notify the authorities of the United States. It is hoped this will curtail Great Lakes smuggling.

Detailed provisions are made for the exchange of information back and forth across the border between officials of the two countries intended to head off smuggling of liquor, narcotics and merchandise. Provision is made also to expedite transportation of liquor into the Yukon country. In general, the customs service is to be tightened up against smuggling of all kinds.

MINERS AND OWNERS REACH NO AGREEMENT

All Proposals Rejected Wholesale by Strikers, Who Refuse To Yield.

Philadelphia, Aug. 23.—Both anthracite operators and miners today were apparently proceeding with their original plans for whatever the situation is to be in the coal fields after September 1, while citizens' committees appealed in vain for pledges assuring peace.

The last week of the present working contract opens tomorrow. No single contact remains between the mine owners and the men. The operators say flatly any renewal of the contract on its expiration August 31, must provide against increase in "production cost," while, as for granting the men's plea for the check-off, the owners call that impossible.

The miners have made wholesale rejection of all terms, and they take the stand that till the owners show some yielding, even negotiations are useless. Neither group at the present indicates the slightest sign of compromise.

MAN HIT BY TRAIN, DIES IN HAMILTON HOSPITAL

MANY PROSPECTS FOR SENATE SEATS

Forty Names Mentioned in Connection With Two Ontario Vacancies.

Stratford, Aug. 23.—According to Mayor Tom Brown, who returned today after a motor trip, in company with Mrs. Brown, to the Maritime provinces, no fewer than 40 names have been mentioned in connection with the two senatorial vacancies in Ontario. This information was received during the course of an informal interview he had with Premier King, Dr. J. P. Rankin, M. P. for North Perth, and W. H. Gregory.

Though somewhat non-committal in his remarks, Premier King did reiterate his oft-repeated assertion that providing his lieutenants were in accord, he would go to the people this autumn. He made no secret of the fact that certain of the party leaders were anxious to defer the election until the spring.

KLANSMEN HOLD PUBLIC GATHERING

Appeal Made To Men and Women in St. Thomas To Join Organization.

St. Thomas, Aug. 23.—The Ku Klux Klan appeared publicly in the city for the first time tonight, when 1,500 people listened to an organization address in Pinarof park. There was no regalia in sight, and the meeting was quiet and orderly.

The klansmen in Canada to stay, and that it was in St. Thomas that was the tenor of the remarks of Dr. J. H. Hawkins of Toronto, a native of Virginia. "The Klan fights no man unless he places his hand on the sacred institutions of Canada," he said.

"The Klan is admittedly a restricted order," he declared. "It fights no man, but it sets out to advance the cause of Christianity, the real heart and soul of Christianity."

Rolling stockings and short skirts were deprecated by the speaker. The lowering of standards was due to the attitude of Asiatics towards women. "The Klan," he said, "is striving to maintain the purity of Canadian womanhood, he declared."

"The Klan doesn't wear a mask or hood, merely a helmet," he declared. "We will take it off only when we want to; it is our business. 'If the people who fight us raise their masks and come out into the open we will stand side by side with them.'"

There is an organization for women, Dr. Hawkins pointed out, and he hoped all women in St. Thomas would come forward and take part in the new order. He described the Ku Klux Klan as an organization of "pure, gentle, Protestant people, to uphold Protestantism, to build up the church, to fight for public schools and to protect womanhood."

Drawing attention to a libel action which he had started against a paper to stay the Dominion Patriot for an alleged slanderous statement, Dr. Hawkins stated that the paper was being circulated contrary to a court injunction, and if the practice was continued arrests would be made.

Following the address cards were passed out with the request that names of interested parties be subscribed thereon. A large number of men were seen to turn the cards in.

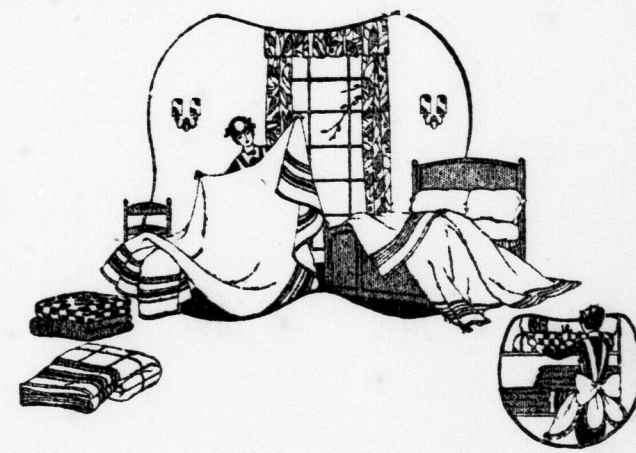

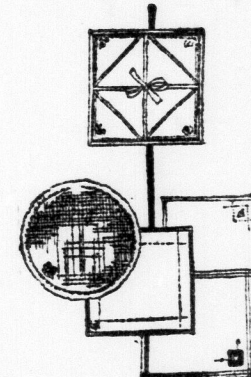

SHIP SPACE LACK FORCES CRISIS IN CATTLE EXPORT

Defeat of Petersen Contract Threatens Heavy Losses To Farmers.

MEIGHEN SCORED

Ottawa, Aug. 23.—In the opinion of Hon. W. R. Meighen, minister of agriculture, Canada is approaching a real crisis in the cattle export business by reason of the lack of space on the Atlantic route. "All space at the present time has been booked," said Mr. Meighen, "and a serious shortage of space is threatened in

September. "The shortage is partly due to the fact that, owing to the removal of the cattle embargo in Great Britain, there has been a heavy increase in the raising of stockers, and partly due to the fact that owing to the abundance of grass and pasture this year, cattle have matured for shipment earlier than usual."

"It all goes to show," remarked Mr. Meighen, "that those responsible for defeating the Petersen contract for ten general cargo and cattle boats have some responsibility to shoulder at the present moment. I see that Mr. Meighen has been promising that if he is returned to power he will assist the farmers along that line," stated the minister.

Borer Invasion Getting Serious

U. S. Expert Declares Situation Worse Than in Ohio.
