At a meeting of the Selkirk Mining and Smelting Co., held on Monday, the old board of directors were re-elected. The president, Mr. G. B. Wright, refers first to the construction of trails to their properties, some seven miles of which were made at a cost of \$5,000. The sampling and crushing mill, with attached assay of fice, cost some \$7,800. A dwelling for the superintendent and various other buildings were erected. A number of mines were opened up, but the Lanark proved to be a continuous ore body, and about two hundred tons of ore was shipped from this mine to the Selby smelting works, San Francisco, the average net yield at the smelter being \$60 per ton. Several mines of grey copper and galena were also opened up on the north side of the mountain, but it was impossible to get the ore out last autumn owing to the early snow fall. Several tons in the dump of the Sutton and Sprague mines would average fully \$200 to the ton. When the Lanark mine was abut down in the fall the ore body had been penetrated so far thot the superintendent estimated the ore in sight at \$40,000.

During the winter months four miners were employed running a tunnel in the direction of the vein, ninety feet below the dump, and in the spring a shaft which had been sunk twenty feet was continued at an angle of eighty degrees, following a true context vein to the level of this tunnel. Work has been continued since, and it is estimated that there is now \$5,000 cubic feet of ore in sight. Of this 1,600 tons could be shipped which, at \$65 per ton profit, would net \$104,000. The ore body in the upper works is equally rich, and in one place is 25 feet in width. Besides the amount of ore from which money can be realized at once there are now \$500 tons on the dump, which will average from \$20 to \$40 to the ton. When a smelter is erected in the province this second grade ore can be shipped at a profit.

This would need to be 1½ miles in length and would cost \$12,000. The cost for packing on mules, as at present, is \$10 per ton, whereas by the tramway it could be conveyed to the care for fifty cents per conveyed to the cars for fifty cents per ton. A concentrator of 40 or 50 tons capacity is also necessary for treating the

cond grade ore.
