

Queen Adelaide Reaches Port

Brings Heavy Cargo From the Orient—Japanese Steamship Disaster.

Letter Received Yesterday From One of the Tillikum's Voyagers.

Steamer Queen Adelaide arrived at the outer wharf yesterday morning after a rough trip from the Orient, being delayed three days by heavy gales encountered off the coast of Japan, which prevented her making much headway. The storm was encountered from the time the steamer cleared from Kobe, and when a day out she passed the China Mail steamer Yangtze inbound to Kobe, laboring like the Queen Adelaide in the confused seas caused by the heavy winds. It was a stormy trip throughout. The Queen Adelaide brought a total cargo of 3,200 tons of freight, of which she landed 192 tons, mostly sugar, at the outer wharf.

From Kobe she brought news of the loss of the Tsurukichi Maru, a Japanese steamer of 2,000 tons, engaged in carrying coal from Kobe to Hongkong, with a crew of 50 all told, and of this company, but one survivor was reported. The steamer, which was owned by Messrs. Okura & Co. of Tokyo, left Kobe for Keelung on October 4, and after loading her cargo at Keelung she put to sea, and on the morning of October 7 went ashore on Meiji island, in Goto archipelago, and soon became a total wreck. But one of the crew reached shore. The Tsurukichi Maru was formerly the Chittanaga, and was purchased by her Japanese owners at a cost of 120,000 yen.

Chinese papers received by the Queen Adelaide have references to the expected death of Li Hung Chang, news of which has been received by cable, and the Pekin correspondent of the Vancouver paper writes: "Li Hung Chang's illness is acute dysentery, and the general break-up of old age. His heart is at times very irregular, and his death might occur at any time." RACING TO AUSTRALIA.

Benjamin Sewell and General Fairchild Start on Long Ocean Race.

The ship Benjamin Sewell, which, after loading lumber at Vancouver, was towed to Port Townsend to outfit, is racing to Australia with the ship General Fairchild, which left Port Townsend at the same time. Under the sailing arrangements the Fairchild will take the usual route for sailing to the big continent in the Victoria strait, south of Australia by way of Bass' strait.

The Sewell, on the other hand, will take the northern route, following the usual track of vessels bound for Hongkong until the Philippines are reached. Thence southward for the Indian ocean by way of the straits and sea of Macassar. The vessels are well matched for the race, there being but 13 tons difference in the burden, the Sewell being 1,320 to the 1,307 of the General Fairchild.

CANADA'S SHIPPING.

Dominion Has a Fleet of 6,735 Vessels Owned in Her Ports.

The total number of vessels in the register books of the Dominion on December 31, 1900, was 6,735, measuring 659,534 tons register tonnage, being an increase of 37 vessels and a decrease of 18,518 register as compared with 1899. The number of steamers on the registry books on the same date was 2,101, with a gross tonnage of 293,096. Assuming the average value to be \$30 a ton, the value of the registered tonnage of Canada on December 31 would be \$19,785,090. The number of new vessels built and registered in Canada during 1900 was 297, measuring 22,323 tons register tonnage. The foregoing figures were not received by the marine department until well into the present year, and are now published for the first time.

MARINE NOTES.

D. G. S. Quadra returned yesterday from a lightship tendering cruise to the West Coast Lighthouses. Tug Lorne leaves this morning for Vancouver to tow the British ship Garuda to Tacoma, where she will load a cargo of wheat for England. Steamer Victoria is due from the Orient on Tuesday. R. M. S. Empress of China is due from the Orient on Wednesday. Surveys are being made for a new marine ways which are to be constructed at the Victoria Machinery depot. The cradle is to accommodate any vessel up to 3,000 tons.

FROM THE TILLIKUM.

N. K. Lutton Writes of the Tillikum's Trip's Through Southern Seas. A letter was received yesterday by Mr. Ormond, the Government stationer, from N. K. Lutton, one of the two adventurous voyagers, who make up the crew of the schooner-rigged canoe yacht Tillikum, the four-ton craft in which they have made a long cruise, voyaging age. The letter, which is dated from Apia, Samoa, on October 12, says that after 58 days at sea, without seeing a sail, the Tillikum was anchored at Apia, and was then the only vessel in the harbor when the letter was written at 92 Government street. Mr. Lutton writes briefly, saying that he will write later details of the voyage after the Tillikum's arrival at Suva, in the Fiji's, whether she started to cruise after leaving Apia. The course followed by the little vessel was as follows: "Trace the longitudinal line 124 to 126 south, as far as latitude 11 north, where we enjoyed ourselves for 15 days in heavy gales, with rain and dirty weather. We gave up the Tahiti course after three storms and shaped southwest, and crossed the equator at longitude 145, and then to Pagan Island, and after a short stay there, on to Humber Island, Danger Island, and thence to Apia. From Apia the writer and J. C. Voss intend to go to Sydney and thence by stages to the Metropolis."
