According to the instrument here, the earthquake was of considerable magnitude and began about midnight of May 31st, eastern time. The strongest portion of the motion, however, began at thirty-four minutes past 12 a.m., June 1st, and continued for about eleven minutes. The total duration of the earthquake was nearly two hours, and the components of motion were re-corded from every direction.
