SHINANO IN TYPHOON. Japanese Liner Was Caught in Storm Ninety Miles Out From Hongkong.

Steamer Shinano Maru, which arrived on Tuesday, was caught in the heavy typhoon which swept down upon Hongkong so suddenly on September 19 and which caused such damage to the Shinano was ninety miles from Hongkong, bound from that port to Yokohama, and her ports and ventilators were open for the weather.

Advices were received from Hongkong by the Shinano Maru that the Chinese, at first hiding their losses, quickly came to the police to report when they learned that subscriptions were being raised to reimburse them for the loss of their junks.

HONGKONG HAS FREQUENTLY SUFFERED from typhoons. The harbor lies in such a position that with the wind in any direction the whole area of the harbor is practically swept from end to end.

CYCLONE CAUSES WHOLESALE DEATH AND DESTRUCTION

Terrific Hurricane Sweeps Coasts of Florida, Central and South American Republics, Blotting Out Life, Wrecking Ships and Spreading Ruin Through Prosperous Districts—Storm Moves Out on Atlantic Ocean.

NEW YORK, Oct. 19.—A special despatch to the Evening Journal from Havana reports 100 dead as the result of a cyclone. The cruiser Brooklyn was torn from its moorings and thrown on the shore.

A special cablegram from Havana to the Evening Telegram says: "Over one hundred are dead today from the worst cyclone which has ever visited this city. The whole American fleet was menaced and the cruiser Brooklyn torn from her moorings and thrown upon the shore."

Alarm in Hotels. During the height of the storm there was great alarm among the guests of the Inglaterra and other hotels. Doors, windows and skylights were blown in and the rain flooded the rooms.

Many Ships Missing. San Juan, Porto Rico, Oct. 19.—The Red Line steamer Philadelphia from La Guayra, Venezuela, for New York, arrived here today forty-eight hours late. Her captain reports that a Dutch steamer was lost in the cyclone between Curacao and Lagayra.

Report From Havana. Havana, Oct. 19.—A storm of unprecedented severity accompanied by a torrential downpour of rain, swept over Havana and the entire province of Matanzas Wednesday night and resulted in twenty deaths in this city and the serious injury of a dozen or more persons.

Chaos in Military Camp. The two thousand American soldiers and marines at Camp Columbia were put to great inconvenience. Nearly all the four hundred tents in the camp were blown down, but there was little actual damage.

Fishing Fleet Destroyed. Miami, Fla., Oct. 19.—The steamer Lucia, Capt. Braye, has sunk off the Florida coast. One of the excursion steamers arrived in port tonight bringing sixty wounded, who were taken to the hospital and it is said there are 28 dead bodies which will be brought up tomorrow.

MINERS SHOT. Steubenville, O., Oct. 20.—Twenty-five disgruntled miners of the United States Coal Company of Cleveland were the result of an attack of malaria, complicated with stomach trouble.

ROJESTVENSKY ACQUITTED. St. Petersburg, Oct. 19.—The court-martial which has been trying the officers of the torpedo boat Besovoi for surrendering her to the Japanese after the battle of the Sea of Japan, has found Capt. Baranoff and Capt. Crapier guilty of cowardice and sentenced them to be cashiered.

FIRE COSTS HALF MILLION. Large Furniture Building and Theatre Destroyed at Alton, Pa. Alton, Pa., Oct. 19.—Fire started today in the ninth story of the Oliver Rothert Furniture building and before it was brought under control property to the amount of nearly a half million dollars was destroyed.

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Telegraphic communication has been re-established with Havana. The Havana Telegraph office reports that the damage there was very severe. Much property was done to shipping in the harbor and many trees on the praya were uprooted.

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MARINE NOTES. Captain E. H. Soule, master of the steamship Oregon, wrecked off Cape Hinchinbrook, was at Seattle notified by the United States marine inspectors of their decision that he was not considered blamable for the loss of his vessel.

The old coal barge Nanaimo lies submerged alongside the Mail Dock and will probably be found too badly damaged to repair says the San Francisco Chronicle. The Nanaimo, while being towed alongside a vessel, struck the Doric and filled with water. She had about 800 tons of coal on board and much of this may be lost.

BURIED WITH HONORS. Richmond, Va., Oct. 19.—The train bearing the body of Mrs. Jefferson Davis arrived here today and was met by Lieutenant Governor Ellison and deacons from Lee and Pickett camps of Confederate veterans who escorted the body to St. Paul's church. The funeral took place at 3 o'clock.

GRANBY WILL NOT CLOSE DOWN

The management of the Granby announces that, as copper is only a penny the highest it has been in half a century, it will not close down the smelting plant. It is a copper bopper now down to 15 cents, like it was a few years ago. The plant would have to cease operations, as it could not under the circumstances pay the increased cost of coke.

BLAZE IN KANSAS CITY. Kansas City, Kas., Oct. 20.—Fire this afternoon caused a loss of over \$150,000 and for a time threatened the business center. A high wind made it difficult to fight the flames and it was necessary to call for help from Kansas City, Mo. The Masonic Temple valued at \$50,000, many booths containing valuable exhibits and five residences were destroyed.
