MILWAUKEE, Wis., April 13.—A Sentinel special from Sturgeon Bay, Wis., says that the schooner Ottawa with a crew of six was wrecked at Clay Bank and all the crew lost some time today.

Owing to a fog, nothing was known of the accident until late when three bodies were washed ashore and then farmers sent here for the life-saving crew, which located the schooner in the fog a mile off shore. It is sus- pected the schooner was wrecked early in the morning, because the table was set for breakfast, but the crew had not eaten. The men, it is supposed, were drowned when trying to get ashore, though if they had remained on the schooner all would have been rescued.
