LENGTHY MEETING OF TOWN COUNCIL

Contribution of \$350 Granted From the Town for Field Kitchen for 26th Batt.

A meeting of the Town Council was held on Wednesday evening in the Council chambers, His Worship Mayor Andrew presiding. There was also present Councillors Quinn, Patterson, Goss, Miller, McLean, Alexander, Ellsworth and Evans.
The minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed.
Communication read from F. E. Shepherd asking for Water and Sewerage connection on Prince William Street. Laid on table.
Communication read from Mrs. A. F. Yerxer regarding claim for husband's wages. The Town Clerk was instructed to reply as to Council's position in the matter.
Communication read from M. P. Moores regarding the removal of chimney at site of old power house. Laid on table.
Communication read from City Clerk of St. John, regarding license fees for taxicabs ordered filed.
Communication read from Mayor Frink, St. John, regarding proposed gift of Field Kitchens for 26th Battalion. Laid on table.
Communication read from J. G. Watling regarding Assessment. Referred to Assessment and Appeals Committee.
Communication read from Jas. D. Sargeant regarding Assessment. Referred to Assessment and Appeals Committee.
Communication read from Thos. Carter asking rebate of Poll-tax. Referred to Assessment and Appeals Committee.
With regard to this it was resolved that all claims for rebate of Poll-tax by reason of age must be accompanied with proofs of age.
Communication read from John T. Vautour resigning his position as School Trustee. Laid on table.
Two communications read from E. Sullivan, one enclosing cheque for \$160 in full payment of 1913 taxes, the other asking rebate on taxes paid in error for Massey Harris Co. After a long discussion on this matter a Committee composed of Councillors Miller, Ellsworth and Alexander was instructed to wait on Mr. Sullivan and try and get the matter straightened out.
Communication read from Police Officer T. Mann resigning his position on the Police force. Laid on table.
A batch of applications for the position of Police officer were also laid on the table.
Communication read from Frank Gorham asking increase of salary. Mr. Gorham explained he was working at the same salary as he started with three years ago. Referred to Electric Light Committee.
Petitions for license were received from:
J. J. Arseneau, 2 horse livery.
Geo. Dunn, 1 horse trucking.
Geo. Main, 1 horse trucking.
These were referred to Police and License Committee.

The following reports recommending payment of account: were on motion received and adopted:
Public Property and Streets \$51.87
Finance 53.40
Fire Protection 44.68
Water and Sewerage 494.51
Electric Light 623.54
A report was received from Police and License committee recommending that a license for two pool tables be granted Arthur Vermette in accordance with the by-laws, and that a business license be granted D. Goldenberg on payment of \$50. Report was received and adopted.
The Electric Light Committee presented a report making certain recommendations regarding extra lights and various repairs at Power station. After discussion this was referred back to the committee to give estimates of cost. This report brought up the matter of the O'Leary property once more, some of the councillors feeling that if more street lights were to be put there, sidewalks and street improvements should also be carried out. In the end the Town Solicitor was instructed to get in touch with the O'Leary's solicitor and endeavor to get the matter of deeds properly arranged.
The Water and Sewerage committee presented a report making certain recommendations for the extension of Water and Sewerage on Hillside Street East, on the Pichette property, and on Prince William Street South. After full discussion the part relating to Prince William Street South was adopted, estimated cost \$596.46, and the other two items held over.
Councillor Miller introduced a resolution regarding the overdraft at the Bank of Nova Scotia. This gives the town power to overdraft until the assessment is ready.
During the evening some plain speaking was indulged in as to the financial standing of the town, matters relating to the sale of Bonds and overdraft being fully discussed; some of the councillors being of opinion that there were other banks in the town and if the Bank of Nova Scotia did

PRZEMYSL IS AGAIN IN AUSTRIA'S HANDS

Italian Artillery Doing Great Work Outer Defences of Trieste Bombarded. Great Rush to Join the Colors in Italy.

London, June 3rd.—Battle for Przemyśl continues with unabated fury. Situation of 100,000 Germans across River San perilous. Brilliant success or utter disaster awaits them. Italy's fleet searches in vain for enemy along Austrian coast. Rush to colors in Rome swamps recruiting station. News from west continues encouraging. Belgian trawler Delta sunk by submarine.
Vienna, June 3rd.—Przemyśl is again in Austrian hands, according to official announcement made here today.
Rome, June 3rd.—Bombardment of Austrian forts defending Trieste commenced by Italians. Heavy artillery of Italians reduced Austrians fortress of Belvedere, north of Alas, one of works defending Bosetti, on south. This victory opens way for further advance of Italian army up Adige valley toward Trent on Friuli. Italian troops fighting under enormous difficulties, have gained Monte Roe, an important peak, which they are fortifying.
Petrograd, June 3rd.—Official statement last night says repulsed successfully several attacks and captured redoubt east of village of Trawlinay, on Naren, left bank of Vistula. Enemy on Tuesday delivered several attacks, which were repulsed. In Galicia on Monday, between Vistula and Przemyśl stubborn fighting developed, our troops gaining some comfort out of successes on the left bank of lower San.
Paris, June 3rd.—War office reports in region north of Arras, artillery fighting was continued during last night. Also very violent infantry fighting to east of Notre Dame de Lorette, but positions held. Neither one side nor other have undergone any change.
