ed to report. Clauses of the Behring Sea Bill. Sir Charles Russell's bill for the ratifica-tion of the decision of the Behring Sea tribunal provides that any violation of the terms of the award is punishable, and authorizes British warships to seize British vessels ergaged in violation of the award. The bill also empowers Her Majesty the Queen-in-council to authorize certain named officers in the United States navy equally to seize British ships found violating the

In the American bill a similar provision will be included, empowering British officers to seize American vessels. The bill also fixes the time of closing the fisheries, specifies the protective area, prescribes the authorized modes of capture and gives the rule by which the system of licenses is to be worked.


