**BELIEVES DOCTORS SHOULD AVOID T. B. CURE PUBLICITY UNTIL TRUE FACTS OF CASE HAVE BEEN LEARNED.**

Minneapolis.—Publicity for medical research looking toward a cure of tuberculosis was approved by Charles J. Hatfield, president of the National Tuberculosis Association, in an address before the opening session of the annual convention of that body here today, where results of the research have been thoroughly tested and accepted.

"Nothing should be said about experiments not yet completed," said Dr. Hatfield.

"Within the year just passed," Dr. Hatfield continued, "we have been interested in the report of a successful treatment of tuberculosis by the injection of a mineral preparation as announced from Denmark. In this case, the test of science as applied to the treatment has rendered a verdict of 'not proved.'" Dr. Hatfield's statement referred to the so-called gold cure of Dr. Mollgaard of Copenhagen. The announcement of new discoveries that have not been thoroughly tested, or of wonderful plans that are still to be carried out," continued Dr. Hatfield, "can do great harm. All of us condemn such measures. On the other hand investigation must be made popular. The public must be educated and interested in order that support may be forthcoming. Perhaps the most serious danger is that public announcements be restricted to results that have been thoroughly tested and accepted, and that nothing be said about experiments not yet completed."

Dr. Hatfield announced that the International Union against Tuberculosis would meet in the United States as guests of the National Tuberculosis Association in October, 1925.

Reports from all parts of the United States, according to Dr. Hatfield, indicate that the tuberculosis death rate is continuing to decline and is now rapidly approaching the 90 mark for each 100,000 population. The Christmas Seal Sale since 1917 has grown from \$1,599,696 to \$4,500,000 in 1924.

At the reading of reports, the report on Denominational Finance showed that many churches were still far behind in their allotment, but many have bright prospects of reaching the full amount before the end of July.

The report on Denominational Literature urged for better reading material in the homes. Magazines and other secular matter should not take the place of good wholesome religious literature. Rev. R. C. Moore, Editor of the "Maritime Baptist," urged the claims of that paper upon the Baptist people. It provides religious reading which could not be obtained in any other form at the price.

The afternoon session was taken up by the W. M. U. Mrs. F. H. Beale Wolfville, and Mrs. Ralph Gullison, India were the speakers.

In the evening an address was given by Rev. A. J. Prosser on "children's Aid Work," presenting the needs of the feeble-minded, delinquent and neglected children. Mr. Prosser described some scenes and conditions which touched the hearts of his audience.

Rev. E. S. Mason, Supt. of Home Missions followed with an address on the needs of our Home Mission work.

A large audience assembled at the Sunday morning service. Rev. W. S. Smith, of Paradise, was the preacher of the Associational sermon. He used for his text Psalm 78:5, "The children of Ephraim, being armed, and carrying bows, turned back in the day of battle." In a clear, forceful and compelling manner he urged the need of a practical Christianity. The church should make her influence and power felt in the solution of the great problems which face our people. Temperance Legislation, political corruption, the upholding of Protestant ideals, and the battle for peace came under the preacher's review. The church must take her stand on matters of such vital importance if the principles of Christianity are to be sustained.

At the afternoon session a report was given by the Sunday School work, followed by an address from Rev. W. C. Machum, Maritime Secretary of Boy's Work. With his usual fluency and persuasiveness, Mr. Machum gave an inspiring address on the social, moral and religious needs of the young people.

The evening session was the final meeting of the Association. To an audience that overflowed the building, Rev. A. J. Prosser, of India, and Rev. Ralph Gullison of India spoke on Baptist Foreign Work. Mr. Gullison gave a clear and illuminating address on the history and progress of the Baptist missionary enterprise in Bolivia. Mr. Gullison forcefully presented the needs of our work in India, and closed with an appeal to the churches to apply Christianity in their own lives that they may be true to the great cause that has been committed to them.

Several of the resolutions presented by the Resolution Committee and endorsed by the Association are as follows:

(1) Whereas it has been shown that the title deeds to some of our Church properties require investigation, your committee would therefore recommend that this matter be brought to the attention of the Convention by the Clerk of the Association.

(2) Whereas this Association has heard with satisfaction of the excellent work being done in Annapolis, Digby and Yarmouth counties by our brother Rev. A. J. Prosser, in the interest of child welfare; Be it therefore resolved that we extend to Mr. Prosser our deep appreciation for the splendid work he is doing for the Kingdom and commend the same to our churches for their loyal support.

(3) Whereas Dr. H. R. Grant, General Secretary of the Social Service Council of Nova Scotia has delivered a splendid address giving a concise outline of the work he is doing; Be it resolved that this Association place itself in record endorsing his efforts along the lines of advances of social, moral and religious life, to the children.

(4) Resolved: that this Association again place itself on record as being opposed to the liquor traffic in whatever form it may appear that we regret the tendency to make N. S. Temperance Act a means of raising revenue. From observation no other conclusion can be arrived at than this: that no serious attempt is being made to enforce the law.

Further resolved: that we regard the continuance of the liquor warehouse in Halifax a serious menace to successful enforcement and contrary to the spirit and letter of prohibitive legislation.

Further resolved: that this Nova Scotia Western Baptist Association here assembled again urge that the will of the people be the prohibition of the liquor traffic as it has been expressed on several occasions be seriously noted.

**SUM OF \$10,000,000 FOR RURAL CREDITS.**

Hon. Mr. Robb's Bill Provide For Advances to Provinces.

Ottawa.—Hon. J. A. Robb, acting Minister of Finance, has brought down a bill to provide for advances of not more than \$10,000,000 to the provinces for rural credits.

The bill will provide:

(1) That the Governor-in-Council may authorize advances to any one or more of the provincial governments for the purpose of assisting agriculture by enabling the province to make long term loans to farmers.

(2) That such advances shall be secured by the issue and delivery to the Dominion of bonds of the provinces.

(3) That the aggregate of advances to be made by the Dominion shall not exceed \$10,000,000.

**MUST PAY INCOME TAX OF \$1,900,000.**

Londoner Made Profit of \$20,000,000 in Deal in Airplane Linen.

London.—The story of how a London dealer in agricultural machinery through a chance visit to a warehouse bought the entire surplus of airplane linen of the British Government, consisting of 45,000,000 yards, and through a modern advertising campaign resold it in a few months at a profit of more than \$20,000,000, was told in court today. With the exception of a nominal deposit the deal which is described as "one of the boldest coups since the war," was put through without an advance of money Leonard J. Martin, the dealer paying cash to the Government upon the receipt of each order. The Government received \$37,230,000 and also assessed Martin £1,900,000 income tax.

An attempt to avoid assessment on the ground the venture was a pure gamble was dismissed today, and Martin must pay the huge tax.

He sold the linen to the housewives of Britain after Belfast manufacturers had refused to purchase it. The manufacturers, however, were alarmed and later purchased all they could get.

**WHEAT CROP MAY BE 500,000,000 BUSHELS.**

Prediction of President of Maple Leaf Milling Company.

Toronto.—"If the present unprecedented prospects continue unchanged and are permitted to materialize into an actual harvest, it will be the greatest the country has ever known, possibly exceeding 500,000,000 of the Maple Leaf Milling Company, said on his arrival in Toronto today from Western Canada, speaking on the wheat prospects.

"While the western crop has many possible vicissitudes to face before harvest, conditions at this time of the year have never been more favorable in any previous year," Mr. Stewart remarked. "June is the critical month, and this year the first half of June has given us ideal weather, with copious rains and cool temperatures.

"A strong, healthy plant has already been developed over the entire prairie country, and there are about 22,000,000 acres sown to wheat this year. If the crop is up to average, judged by yields of previous years, the country would have a crop of at least 400,000,000 bushels."


