years the western Settlers have received frequent accounts of a Nation at a great distance up the Mission (a branch of the Mississian in manners and appearance refembling other Indians, but speaking Welsh, and retaining fome ceremonies of the Chrissian Worship; and at length this is univerfally believed to be Fact. Captain Abraham Chaplain of Kentucky (a Gentleman whose veracity may be entirely depended upon) affured me that in the late War, being with his Company in Garrison at Kaskaski, fome Indians came there and speaking the Welsh Language, were perfectly understood and conversed with, by two Welshmen in his Company, and that they informed them of their stuation as mentioned above."

Mr. Morgan Jones adds from Mr. Filfon "that there are remains in Kentucky which prove that the Country was formerly inhabited by a nation farther advanced in the arts of Life than the Indians; and that thefe are ufually attributed to the Welfh, who are fuppofed formerly to have inhabited thefe parts. He alfo fays that a great number of regular intrenchments are found there, and ancient Fortifications, with Ditches and Baftions; one in particular, containing about fix Acres of Land, and others three Acres; that pieces of earthen-ware were plowed up, a manufacture which the Indians never were acquainted with.
