

Purse \$175, \$100 to first, 50 to second, 25 to third.

4. Running Race, open to all. Mile heats, 2 in 3. Purse \$200, 125 to first, 50 to second, 25 to third.

SECOND DAY.

5. Running Race, open to all. Mile heats, 2 in 3. Purse \$125, 80 to first, 30 to second, 15 to third.

6. 3 minute Test, open to all horses that never beat 3 minutes previous to date of bill. Mile heats, 2 in 3. Purse \$100, 50 to first, 40 to second, 20 to third.

7. Running Race, open to all. 2 mile dash. Purse \$175, 100 to first, 50 to second, 25 to third.

8. Open Trot, open to all. Mile heats, 3 in 5. Purse \$200, 125 to first, 50 to second, 25 to third.

9. Consolation Purse \$75, for all horses not winning first or second money in any race; 50 to first, 25 to second.

Rules and Regulations.

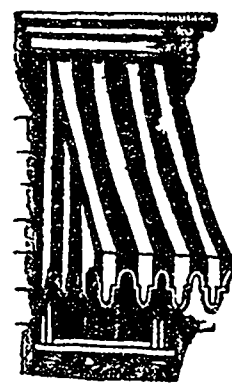
1. Races Nos 3, 4, 7, 8 and 9 to be governed by the Dominion Turf Rules.

 6. Entries on Saturday, Sept. 11, at 9 p. m.
 7. Entrance fee to accompany all nominations.
 8. Judges' decision in all cases to be final.

FIRST DAY.

Tuesday, Sept. 24th Trotting—Purse \$150,
\$100 to first, 40 to second, 10 to third. Open to
all horses that never beat 2:50 prior to Sept. 18,
1875.

Running—Purse \$125—One and an eighth
mile, single dash, \$100 and entrance returned to
first, 25 and entrance returned to second. En-
trance only \$5. To carry 100 lbs, with an allow-
ance of 7 lbs to all horses bred in the Dominion
of Canada, and to all horses that have not won
a race this season.

SECOND DAY.

Wednesday, Sept. 29—Hurdle Race - Purse
\$250—Two mile dash, over 8 hurdles 8 ft. 6 in.
high; \$185 and entrance returned to first, 50
and entrance returned to second, 15 and entrance
returned to third. Entrance only \$5. Handi-
cap weight to be announced Sept. 27.

Trotting—Purse \$350—\$225 to first, 100 to
second, 25 to third; open to all horses that never
beat 2:35 prior to Sept. 18, 1875.

Running—Purse \$225—\$165 and entrance re-
turned to first, 60 and entrance returned to sec-
ond. Entrance only \$10; mile heats, 2 in 3.

THIRD DAY.

Thursday, Sept. 30—Trotting—Purse \$500;
\$350 to first, 150 to second, 50 to third; open
to all.

Running—Purse \$350; \$275 and entrance re-
turned to first, 75 and entrance returned to
second. Entrance only \$10; 1 1/2 mile heats, 2
in 3. The winner of the mile heat race to carry
7 lbs extra.

Steeplechase—Purse \$350—Over a course
about 2 1/2 miles. Handicap. Weights to be an-
nounced Sept. 29th, after the Hurdle Race. \$250
and entrance returned to first, 75 and entrance
returned to second, 25 and entrance returned to
third; entrance only \$5.

Rules and Regulations.

Trotting Races are mile heats, best 3 in 5, to
harness, and will be conducted under the rules
of the National Trotting Association.

Entrance 10 per cent. of the first money only.
At least three to enter and two to start. A horse
distancing the field to receive only first money.

Running Races are open to all. Three to en-
ter, two to start. Will be conducted under the
Jerome Park Rules.

Jockeys must appear in proper costume, other-
wise they will not be allowed to mount.

In the Dash Race, Hurdle and Steeplechase,
any number of horses may start from the same
stable.

Entries must be in writing, giving name, color,
age, sex, sire and dam of horse, and colors of
rider. This must be strictly observed. A horse
distancing the field to receive only first money.

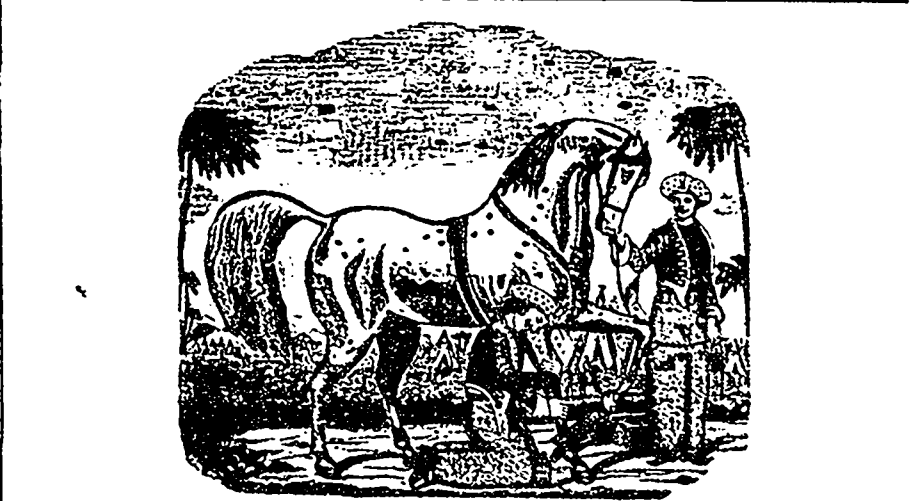
