UNITED PRESBYTERIAN SYNOD.

THE Synod of the United Presbyterian Church of Scotland, met in Edinburgh on Monday evening, May 5th, The retiring Moderator, Dr. Drummond, of Glasgow, preached from Acts

Moderator. In presenting the report of the Committee on Bills and Overtures, Dr. Blair stated that the Committee took up a "Memorial" from members of the church disapproving of the action of Disestab ishment and Disendowment Committee. It had been moved and seconded that the Memorial be not transmitted, as it did not come through the transmitted through the usual channels, it be transmitted to the Synod with an expression of the opinion of the Committee. On the vote being taken, it was found there was a majority not to transmit the " Memorial" to the Synod, and the Committee decided accordingly.

The report on Statistics presented by Rev. John Young, showed that the number of communicants had increased new hopes, new affections, over wide lack of generous ardour in the general life by 1,391, and congregational incomes domains of human life, until those who of our country.
