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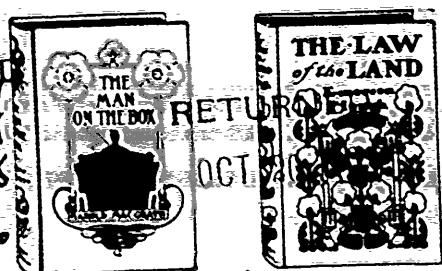

This is no less than "The Memoirs of a Great Detective," being incidents in the life of Detective Murray of the Canadian detective service. In his book Mr. Murray describes with a wealth of incident all the famous cases on which he has been engaged for many years, including the renowned Birchall murder case.

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Newnes' Fall fiction includes this year, "Dialstone Lane," by W. W. Jacobs, "The Phoenix and the Carpet," by E. Nesbit, "Jim Mortimer, Surgeon," by R. S. Warren Bell, and "The Farm of the Dagger," by Eden Phillpotts.
