this idea has not yet been demonstrated, it appears highly probable, from the general occurrence of sugar in the egg. As an instance of the marvellous processes going forward in the human frame, I may mention that in the terrible disease called diabetes all the amylaceous food converted into sugar, instead of being assimilated by the system, as in health, passes away, the sufferer thus deriving no benefit from the food

Sugar lies under a ban for injuring the teeth. What shall we say of this? The negroes employed on sugar plantations, who eat, perhaps, more sugar than any other class of people, have almost proverbially, fine, white, sound teeth, which they retain in old age. But, on the other hand, in England persons employed in the augar reflueries, who are, from their occupation, obliged constantly to be tasting sugar, lose their teeth from decay after a few years.
