With respect to the petition of Jessie Louise Cowan, of the city of Montreal, in the province of Quebec, for an Act to dissolve her marriage with Thomas Martin Cowan, formerly of the said city, vocalist, the Committee find that the requirements of the Rules of the Senate have been complied with in all material respects.

2. The Committee submit herewith a draft Bill to dissolve the said marriage.

On motion of the Honourable Mr. Tanner, it was—

Ordered, That an Order of the Senate do issue for a return to include copies of all correspondence, statutory declarations, statements and other documents in the possession of the Department of Customs and Excise relating to the seizure in December, 1924, of intoxicating liquors claimed by Neil M. MacDonald, hotel keeper of Reserve Mines, County of Cape Breton, N.S.

On motion of the Honourable Mr. Tanner, it was—

Ordered, That an Order of the Senate do issue for a return to include copies of all correspondence, statutory declarations, statements and other documents in the possession of the Department of Customs and Excise relating to the seizure of intoxicating liquors at the premises of Lambert Matthews of Edwardsville, Cape Breton County, N.S., in December, 1924.

A Message was brought from the House of Commons by their Clerk with a Bill (3), intituled: "An Act to amend the Criminal Code (Printer's Liability)," to which they desire the concurrence of the Senate.

The said Bill was read the first time, and—

Ordered, That it be placed on the Orders of the Day for a second reading on Tuesday, next.
