The Forged Trade Keturns and the Forged Fisheries Evidence.

Items transposed or incorrect in the Summary Statement in the Trade Returns. For instance, "Wetale fish" transposed; also "Fish Sallet and Smoked Salmon" should be \$21.60. Thus in the Seasonal Papers for 1968, pages 71 and 72, under "Fish," should be \$21.60 and \$9 for "Wetale fish" — \$5.88 being put in the Summary Statement as \$5.88. This is important, because the figures, 3.688 and 1.192, in the Seasonal Papers for 1968, should make the total \$21.60. This transposition greatly impeded the discovery of the fraud.

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These quantities above \$6 are all sums of the terms $9, 10, 22, 26, 42, 52$ and 56 , which may be further reduced to the sum of these terms taken two, three, four, or five at a time, and hence, in particular, to a sum of terms $10, 22, 26, 42, 52, 56$, and hence *ad infinitum*, with a $\pm$ to a certain extent. They are reciprocally interchangeable with United States, Fyot and Import figures, also with subsequent Canadian Import figures, and with Cotton, Wool, & Canadian Imports from the United States and Great Britain, as will be proved in subsequent sections. The quantities above \$6 are sums of the smaller quantities in regular sequence as in *Fig. Ser. LIII's Table*.
