The Second Adventists and the Universalists are now making great efforts to establish congregations in the place. Well-instructed and staunch Church people are, of course, not at all influenced by any of these religious movements, but there are always a few in every Parish who are weak in the faith, and they are, at all times, liable to be drawn away.

Parish visiting is kept up as usual, and as much time is given to that necessary department of my work as I can

possibly spare.
