

Leafs Win a Game, 5 to 2--Ex-Tiger Secured by Royals--Giants Again

BROWN'S GOOD PITCHING MADE VICTORY POSSIBLE

Leafs Outplayed the Bisons at All Stages and Won With Something to Spare--Jordan Back at First--Two Leafs Draw Suspensions.

BUFFALO, July 7.—(Special.)—With Brown pitching his never had a chance. The score of 5 to 2 is no indication of the playing of the two clubs, as from the very beginning the Toronto Club outplayed their opponents.

For the home club, Gowdy took the first station and Lalonde was placed behind the bat, as Beck is out of the game with a cut foot. "Clymer" used three pitchers in an effort to stop the rush of the visitors, Frill starting the game. He lasted for eight innings and was taken out to allow Lehr to bat for him. Holmes took up the task in the ninth, and after a double had been scored against him, and one run had passed the plate, he retired in favor of Nelson. This was Nelson's first appearance in Buffalo, and he was very favorably received by the fans. He struck out the first batter, allowed a base on balls, and the third out was an easy infield play.

Today was a "kids' day" at Baseball Park and several thousands of the youngsters turned out, and their shrill voices kept up one continuous yell from until the last man was declared out in the ninth. They had plenty of opportunity to exercise their lungs, as Buffalo had men on bases in all except two innings, and the visitors in all except two. The only time that a short fly to right and one flying spirit was in the last two sessions, when they came across with four of their nine hits, one being a double off Bush, and the third was a single and a double.

Leafs and His Little Bat.

The visitors' record was one tally in the first, second, fifth, seventh and ninth. Fitzpatrick was the star with the bat, making a perfect record for the day. In five trips to the plate he made a triple, a double, a single, a sacrifice, and, in the ninth, was given a first base by a bunt. He also had a single and a double, and the latter connecting safely at two different times.

Fitzpatrick, the Canadian, started off with a great blast of a home run, sending a scoreless second, which the visitors never had a chance to get, and the first run of the game was marked up before anyone was out. Shuts said down a pretty punt and beat the throw to first. Jordan was passed to first in this session, filling the bases, but the runners were held there by a short fly to right and two infield flies.

In their half Buffalo also started strong, Jackson hit safely, and the second, and Gowdy was hit by a pitched ball, but their team-mates were unable to drive one out of the infield.

After two had been retired in the second, Fitzpatrick came forward with a clean hit for two bags, and O'Hara again made good with a two-bag hit that gave the visitors their second run. Shuts was an easy out. Bues to Gowdy.

Rochester laid down a beautiful bunt, but W. Bradley had a chance to field it in time. Lalonde waited for four wild ones and stroled down to Jordan's stopping place. At this point, however, the bunt was caught asleep on second by Brown, and the best that Jack Frill could do was three hard swings at the ball.

Again, in the third, Toronto led off with a snappy hit. Northern being the one to go the damage this time. However, the bunt was caught stealing second. W. Bradley flew out to Murray and Jackson made a wonderful catch of Jordan's sky-scaper. The bright spot in the home team's half was a hard crack by Gowdy thru the pitcher's box after two men were retired. Stop No. 1 proved to be his limit, as O'Hara nailed Murray's long hit.

An error helped.

Three men for each faced the pitchers in the fourth, but in the following innings Fitzpatrick, who seemed to have formed the habit, hit a Texas leaguer into left. He attempted to stretch the hit into two bases and was caught, however, by Frill was taking no more chances with O'Hara, and gave him free ticket, but he was out trying to steal on Lalonde. Murray dropped a high one in left field, and Shuts reached the halfway point on the play. He tried to prevent five wild ones from being hit, but he was safe drive to right. W. Bradley ended the torture for the fans by going out, Bues to Gowdy.

One more numeral was added to the visitors' list in the seventh, when Brown lifted the home run, and the bases and was sent home on two sacrifice flies.

Holy's Good Will.

Holmes now took the work for the Bisons, and Holly, the first man to face him, landed on a short, and when he stepped running back to prevent five wild ones from being hit, he was caught. He struck out the hard-hitting O'Hara, walked Shultz, and Northern was easy, Truesdale to Gowdy.

MURPHY PROTESTS.

CHICAGO, July 7.—President Charles W. Murphy of the Chicago Nationals, has protested the second game of yesterday's double-header with St. Louis that was declared forfeited to the latter. He does not deny that his players adopted tactics in an effort to prevent five wild ones from being hit, but he contends that the visiting team offended first by trying to get themselves put out quickly after they had obtained a 3-run lead.
