Discussed the European War From a British Viewpoint-East End News.

East End News. A very interesting lecture, entitled "The European War From a British Viewpoint," was delivered to the Men's Club of St. Aidan's Anglican Church inst night by W. D. McPherson, M.L.A. for West Toronto. There was a very large attendance, with President W. E. Orr in the chair. Mr. McPherson dealt with the position between Servia and Austria arising from the assassination of the Archduke Ferdinand of Austria and the evident understanding between Germany and Austria as to the ultimatum which the latter country should present to Servia in defiance of Russia. 
