## TROTTING STALLIONS TRAINING FOR THE GRAND CIRCUIT CAMPAIGN

Should Win Majority of Fast Class Races This Year—Some Examples in the Second Division.

DETROIT, May 10.—When C. J. Hampton of Buffalo was a prime breeder of trotting horses he so thoroughly propounded the theory that a stallion's vitality was supported by development that there was a pronounced aversion to the campaigning of stallions. In the opening meeting of the Grand Circuit at Detroit in 1909 only twelve stallions were contestants and the classic M. & M. stake for that year had in its big field but a single entrant.

Today it is the fashion to race stallions, and the undeveloped sire commands little attention at the stud. For the coming M. & M. Stake fifteen of the twenty-nine entrants are stallions, and for the Grand Circuit campaign seventy-five trotting stallions are in training. Tommy Murphy has several stallions that are eligible to the 2:10 class, including last year's champion, Battle, by Bingara, and Stratford, winner of nine races in 1913, but when the training season has been finished and the Grand Circuit opens at North Randall, his best pair will be the stallions, Great Ide and Col. Cochran, Jr., both recruits from the half-mile track.

Two years ago Col. Cochran, Jr., was a sound racehorse in the west and in the early part of 1914 he showed himself so much more than a stallion that he was pronounced one of the fastest horses in the stable. An early ailment kept him from going to the post, but he recovered and is being extensively staked. He is the son of Col. Cochran, 1904, a stallion that Geers raced several years ago, and is now well known as the sire of our Colonel and other winners, while maternally he comes from the family that produced Cheney, 2:04½, and Lord Medium, 2:05½.

Great Ide was one of the best horses that raced over Ohio tracks last year, also only four years old. Like all the Peter the Greats, he is a real horse, and it will not be surprising if he proves one of the best trotters of 1915. ## HAMPTON DAME IS BURNING UP TRACK

Covers Distance at Woodbine in Race Time—Trials of One Day.

King's Plate candidates are getting down to real race work at the Woodbine course. The fine weather has enabled trainers to give their charges plenty of light work during the past few weeks and several of the plate horses have already stepped the full distance in better time than it has sometimes been run in the race.

Shortly after 4 o'clock yesterday morning, about which time the railbirds are beginning to leave their roosts, Trainer Johnny Walker brought the Seagram cast-off, Hampton Dame, on the track and bled her one-quarter in 24, and then took her back to the stable. At 9 o'clock he brought the daughter of Inferno—Royal Dame on the track again and worked her the full plate distance, which she covered quite handsily in 2:03 4/5, the first quarter in 24 3/5, one-half in 49 3/5, three-quarters in 1:12 2/5, one mile in 1:42 2/5, one and one-half miles in 1:56 2/5, and the mile and a quarter in 2:03 4/5.

The boy on Hampton Dame weighed 123 lbs., which is 14 lbs. more than she has been allotted for plate day, and was not what could be called urging the filly at the finish.

The fractional times show that Hampton Dame was stepping fast all the way. Her work was within four-fifths of a second of the present plate record of 2:08 4/5, established by Harry Giddings' St. Bass with 108 lbs. up, in 1911.

In 1912, Hearts of Oak, with 113 lbs. up, won the race in two-fifths of a second better than Hampton Dame's work. Last year's plate winner, Bee Hive, with 113 lbs. up, captured the guinea in three-fifths of a second less time than this filly's work.

Some of the railbirds are of the opinion that Hampton Dame, who is being well prepared under the watchful eye of Johnny Walker, having no mishaps between now and plate day, will turn the trick. Or perhaps it will be the old story of merely burning up the track two weeks too early.
