Our colonifts engaged in their enterprizes with the fame view; and, when they were difappointed, they changed their object for others more lucrative to themfelves, and to the mother-country. Difcontent with the various forms of government, civil or ecclefiaftical, that prevailed in their turns at home, during the last century, led many afterwards to feek for more peaceful abodes in that diftant region. But, whatever were the objects of the first fettlers of our American dominions, feparation from the government of Britain was none of them; for, to preferve their connection with their native land. they went all under charters granted by the fovereign of this country, with certain rights to the lands where they fettled, and with the grant of certain powers defined by the charters, and to be administered in such manner as they prefcribe. As corporations, they had rights given them to make bye-laws for themfelves; and, as corporations derived from, and fubfifting by higher authority, they continued fubject to the controul of that authority.
