Replying to yours of the 20th inetant, would eav that the Steel Bare which were rolled at Irondale in 1910 and 1911, were made under many dieadvantagee. The mill was second-hand, and lacking in many ways up-to-date perfection, but the Steel Bars which they turned out were soft and tough and gave universal satisfaction to the user, and were regarded by him as the equal in material to any

The plant was run for a few monthe only, and I believe never attained the perfection which a longer run would have permitted. Their product would euggeet that the base metal from which they rolled Steel Bare was of excellent quality. I am not informed as to the quantity they produced, but it was not large.
