what you can produce; we will say that. while our neighbours build up a Chinese wall, we will impose a reasonable duty on their products coming into this country; at all events, we will maintain for our agricultural and other productions, largely, the market of our own Dominion. The time has certainly arrived when we must consider whether we will allow matters to remain as they are, with the result of being an uninıportant and uninteresting portion of Her Majesty's Dominions, or will rise to the position, which, I believe Providence has destined us to occupy, by means which, I believe, though I may be over sniguine, which my colleagues believe, though they may be over sanguine, which the country believes are lated to bring prosperity and happiness to the people, to give employment to the thousands who are unemployed, and to make this a great and prosperous country, as we all desire and hope it will be.

Mr. MACKENZIE: Will the hon, gentleman give us an estimate of the revenue of the coming year? We have heard nothing of that.

Mr. TILLEY: I am very much obliged to my hon. friend. I was not aware that I had passed it over. I have here a comparative statement, which I will read:—
