BRACKETT VOTES ALONE.

Resolution Demanding Resignation of Depew Defeated.

Albany, Jan. 16.—The state senate this afternoon defeated, by a vote of 34 to 1, the 14 Democratic senators having been excused from voting, Senator Brackett's resolution requesting the resignation of Senator Chauncey M. Depew.

Senator Brackett alone supported the resolution.

This action followed a long debate, opened by Senator Brackett, in which he scathingly attacked Mr. Depew for his connection with the Equitable Life Insurance Company, with an incidental denunciation of Senator Thos. C. Platt.

CAR SLIDES DOWN BANK.

Fifteen Persons Injured, One Fatally, in Trolley Accident.

New York, Jan. 16.—Fifteen persons were injured, one of them so badly that he may die, when a trolley car crowded with passengers, jumped the tracks at the Bronx today, slid down an incline and struck a telegraph pole. The motor was thrown head foremost into a ditch, every window in the car was smashed, and many passengers were cut by broken glass or trampled in the panic when each passenger tried to be the first to escape from the car.

NEGRO TUNNEL WORKERS SMOTHERED IN RIVER BED

Compressed Air Pipe Bursts, But Prompt Action of Foreman Saves Several Lives.

New York, Jan. 16.—Two negro tunnel workers were killed by suffocation and caisson disease, two were drowned, and two others were seriously overcome, and the white foreman and assistant suffered severely in rescuing those who survived, when a compressed air pipe burst in the East River tunnel, on the Man o' War reef, opposite Forty-second-street, early to-day.
