Many important amendments to the rules and constitution of the Canadian Lacrosse Association have been proposed and will come up at the annual meeting at St. Kitts on Friday, March 31. It is expected that in town or village clubs no player shall be allowed to return to the junior or intermediate level of the game after having played on more than one occasion with the senior team. Juniors and seniors of the same club shall appear in exhibition games. Should the president be a member of one of the interested clubs the vice-president shall appoint the referee. A referee may refuse to accept a playing field if he has his positive knowledge that the player holds a playing certificate. The official committee shall consist of five members, not more than two of whom shall be ex-officio, the others to be elected by the association.
