<text> WHERE YOUNG MEN GET A SHOW. In regard to the changes recently made in the officials of the Canadian Pacific Railway, it will be observed that the pro motions have gone by merit, as happens in nearly every instance of railway admin-istration in America, as well as in the Old Country. The railway service seems to be the one service where ability alone is recognized as the basis for promotion, and where young men are brought forward as rapidly as possible. Mr. Hays of the Grand Trunk; Mr. McGuigan, his able assistant; Mr. Shaughnessy of the C.P.R., and his assistants, are all young men, the eldest of them being not more than 46. We trust that the Government at Ottawa-will take a leaf out of the books of the railway companies and run the Intercolonial on the same lines. The sooner this railway is taken out of politics and placed absolutely under the administration of a first-class railway man, who will be supreme in all his appointments, irrespective of politicians, whether rominent or local, the better will it be for the road.

There are a great many other public or semi-public concerns in this country that would stand frequent infusion of fresh blood after the manner of the railways.


