Quincy Ewing, an Episcopal clergyman, at Greenville, Miss., speaking of social equality in the South, said: "Are negroes lynched in Mississippl lest, if they were dealt with in accordance with the laws, they might, perceiving their equality with white people, gradually push on to something like equality with white people in the ways and byways of society? Nay, nay, nay, this will not do. Why, white men of the sort that gather in mobs to 'lynch niggers' are doing more right here in this town, in the year 1901, are doing more, doubtless, in every other town' in Mississippi, unmolested, to batter down this barrier wall against social equality than has ever been done by the negroes in all their history as American citizens. I need not be more explicit; you know what I mean; and if possibly you do not, I need only ask you to keep your eyes open as you walk your street; keep them open night or day, and you will

them open night or day, and you will know."

The Rev. Mr. Ewing is of old Southern aristocratic stock, and he knows what he is talking about.

"Ethiope" thinks the negroes are not particularly anxious to sit at the white man's table, or associate with his family. While they understand "the benefits to be derived from coming in contact with white people of education and culture, they feel also that, coincident with their growth in numbers and intellectual development, there is a increasing consciousness of independence and race pride, which gives promise of better results than can be attained by wasting time in a futile struggle to gain social recognition. Their ambition now is to acquire wealth, education and all those things which go to make up character and usefulness. They are vindicating their rights and capability to exercise and enjoy the fullest measure of American citizenship. They are educating their children. accumulating wealth, pushing into business, and by unselfish devotion, precept and example striving to elevate the masses. Social recognition will come in the fulness of time, as the reward of honorable endeavors and success achieved."

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
