London, Dec. 13.-The text of the the week, elaborating a plan for bring-

ing about one or the other of these Russian-Chinese treaty has aroused considerable discussion on all sides, and it is regarded as a matter of the greatest importance. Some of the newspapers refuse to believe it authentic, as it would be such a victory for Russian diplomacy. The Spectator today, however, believes it to be exact and says: "No forger would have tried so elaborately to protect the pride of China, while securing every Russian object, nothing is ceded open-ly; but Russia is permitted to run a railway to Kirin, and is expressly authorized to keep all the troops she pleases to protect the Manchurian sta-tions, and she is also to fortify Port Arthur for China. No glass is required to interpret phrases like these, which completely invest Russia with military control of Manchuria and the Lia Tung peninsula." Continuing, the Spectator says it thinks the arrange-ment threatens Japan more than Great Britain, which can resist when her commercial rights are threatened.
