THE VESTRIES

Adjourned Meetings Held at St. George's, the Memorial and Ohrist Churches.

The adjourned vestry meeting of St. George's Church, West London, was held last night, with the pastor, Rev. G. B. Sage, in the chair, and among the members present were Messrs. R. A. Jones, Robert F. Kingsmill, T. R. As a Spring Remedy It Meets tie Rhoder, Wm. Ellis, Robert Kennedy, S. Bending and H. C. Wood. The churchwardens' report showed that \$350 had been paid on the church mortgage. Re-ceipts for the year amounted to \$2,344 55 and the expenses \$2,198 19, leaving a balance of \$143 36 on hand. Christ Church aujourned meeting

was presided over by the pastor, Rev. J. H. Moorhouse. The financial statement showed receipts of \$2,471 78, and disbursements of \$2,428 03, leaving a balance of \$43 75 on hand. The committee appointed two weeks ago to consider the question of lighting the church, was continued, with power to call for tenders for the work. Mr. T. A. Parkinson was appointed on the finance committee. The rector was also granted a month's holidays, the wardens to arrange for pulpit supply during his absence.

Mr. Verschoyle Cronyn presided at the adjourneod meeting at the Memor-ial Church vestry. The amount re-quired for the current year for ordinary expenses was estimated at \$3,500. Having no revenue in the form of pew rents or payments for sittings, the churchwardens stated that they could not too strongly recommend the envelope system to all who attended divine service. To meet the deficit from of the current year, a special com-mittee was appointed, and through its exertions all the floating indebtedness had been wiped out, with the excep-tion of a balance of \$2,838 35, due on the organ. The wardens also paid a high tribute to their late rector, Rev. Canon Richardson. The report, in closing, says: "Words cannot do justice to the self-sacrificing devotion, the constant labors, and the great and abundant patience and goodness of Canon and Mrs. Richardson during their many years of work in this congregation.' terest of anyone.

Mr. Little said the paragraph was evidently aimed at him. The Dominion Loan Company had never, directly or indirectly, suggested the purchase of the property. The only interest the company had in any of the sites under consideration was that it held a mortgage on a small portion of the property at the corner of Waterloo and Dundas streets. Personally, he didn't care what the Free Press might say so long as he

kept a clear conscience. Two new sites were suggested in addition to the six already under consideration. They were the Stevenson property, at the corner of Dundas and Colborne streets, and a block owned by Parsons & Belton, corner of Wellington and King streets. All eight properties were thoroughly canvassed. In some cases the prices asked were just double the market value. It was decided to recommend the following: York and Wellington, Waterloo and Dundas, O'Callaghan Terrace, King and Wellington, Lichfield and Richmond.
