

SEIZED PAPERS OF GREAT DEAD

Royal and Diplomats' Memoirs Corralled by Govt.

BISMARCK'S IN EONDON BANK

Many Instances Where Private Documents Have Been Confiscated After Death of the Owner.

London, Oct. 21.—Prince Clovis Hohenzollern's eagerly read but universally condemned indiscretions will have the effect of rendering people henceforth less disposed than heretofore to criticise the high-handed and arbitrary methods adopted by the monarchs and governments of Europe in dealing with their correspondents and papers of great statesmen and court dignitaries at their death.

When the late Sir William White, who was for so many years British ambassador at Constantinople, died suddenly at a hotel at Berlin while on his way home to England on leave of absence, his papers were at once seized by Sir Edward Malet, the English ambassador at Berlin, in spite of the opposition of his widow. The latter was by birth a German, whose mother had been a Russian, and spent all the years of her widowhood in Germany among her relatives.

There were manifest objections to leaving all the confidential English foreign office documents, the secret ciphers, etc., that Sir William happened to have with him at his death in the possession of his widow. It was not much the danger that she herself would make any indiscreet use thereof. But it was the possibility of their falling into the hands of others, either through her own death, through her carelessness or through the dishonesty of those around her.

These were eventualities which the English government could not afford to risk, and that was why Sir Edward Malet, within an hour or so after the death of his colleague, confiscated his papers, being accompanied by members of his staff, and by a German official, owing to the opposition of the widow. It was about the most disagreeable job that ever fell to the lot of Sir Edward Malet during his long diplomatic career.

Then there was the old Countess Hacke, who for fifty years had been the principal lady for many years of the life of the late Emperor Augusta of Germany, and who prided herself on keeping a record of everything that came within her ken. Within an hour after her death, at Coblenz, the Kaiser caused her entire correspondence and papers, as well as her diaries, to be confiscated, and none of them has been returned to her family.

The present King of Italy and his government adopted an identically similar course with the enormous collection of papers and diaries of Sig. Crispi, who was for so many years the prime minister, and it was not until the papers had been carefully sorted by trusted agents of the king, and everything calculated to embarrass the reigning family, the government, and friendly powers had been eliminated, that what was left was restored to his widowed daughter. A generous person. But the daughter, Princess Linguaglossa, was loud and vigorous in her protests. She had been her father's devoted companion and trusted confidante, and had been bent on clearing his memory by the publication of his papers, which she had, so she declared, demonstrated the mendacity and the ingratitude of his detractors. The action of the king prevented her from accomplishing this labor of love.

The late Prince Bismarck was in dread throughout the latter years of his life of the confiscation of his papers, and caused all the originals to be taken out of the country by his son, Prince Herbert, who deposited them in the Bank of England. Having frequently himself ordered the confiscation of the papers of government officials who had ceased to please, the old chancellor dreaded a similar fate. And in spite of the bitterness of the Bismarck family toward the Kaiser, a sense of loyalty to the crown and of the fitness of things

MAY BUILD LINE OF SHIPS TO ITALY

Country Presents Fine Market for Canadian Wheat, Coal and Fish.

Ottawa, Ont., Oct. 19.—Opportunity exists for a much larger reciprocal trade between Canada and Italy than the hitherto \$685,162, which represented the total value of the interchange in 1905.

The greater part of this insignificant volume of trade consisted of Italian exports to Canada; the imports to Italy from Canada amounted to only about one-third of the total trade. Canadian products are still reaching the Italian market, but they go by way of foreign countries and are credited to them; this is particularly true of Canadian food products and minerals. Canada, for instance, sends out little wheat to Italy (only \$38,755 worth in 1905); while the United States exports amount to several hundred thousand dollars' worth yearly. But it is Canadian asbestos which goes there from the United States. Canada sells to the United States which resells to Italy, a considerable quantity of Canadian nickel also used every year in Italy, but the entire importation is credited to the United States, Great Britain or Germany. This is due to the fact that the refineries for this metal are located in those countries.

One of Italy's chief imports is wheat. The official calculation of the Italian Government is that 35,000,000 bushels of foreign wheat will come into Italy this year, and the prospects are that not one bushel of this will come from Canada. Between 25 and 30 million bushels of hard wheat will come from Odessa, on the Black Sea; some 5,000,000 bushels from the Argentine Republic; possibly 1,000,000 bushels of durum wheat from the United States, and the rest from the wheat-growing regions in southern Europe and northern Africa.

Then there is coal. Italy is becoming a great manufacturing country; and her consumption of coal is increasing year by year. There are no coal mines in Italy; nor in any of the countries adjacent; and all that is used has to be brought by ship to the seaports of the country. Hydro-electric power is being developed to the capacity of the water powers, and there are considerable installations throughout northern Italy. In the neighborhood of Milan there has been a development of some 40,000-horsepower which is all absorbed in the industrial enterprises of Lombardy, and many small mills and factories placed along the streams are operated by water power direct. Last year Italy's coal bill amounted to \$30,000,000. Ninety per cent of this was from Great Britain. Austria supplied about one-sixth, the demand and Germany a lesser amount. A certain amount of United States soft coal reaches Italy every year. In the last year for which detailed government figures are available, the United States coal imported was valued at \$1,000,000. There seems to be a considerable market in Italy for coal, and the mines of the maritime American provinces, considering their nearness to the sea, should be able to put coal into Genoa harbor as cheaply as their Pennsylvania competitors.

Italy buys \$10,000,000 worth of fish yearly. Most of this is dried fish and Canada could supply a much larger quantity than the \$12,000,000 worth of codfish and the \$1,600,000 worth of pickled herring which were sent to that country from Canada last year. It is likely that this considerable quantity of Canadian dried fish reach Italy through other markets, and if these were placed direct the extra profits would go to the Canadian fish merchants in place of the foreign middleman. Canada's fish exports last year ran over \$11,000,000. Italy's imports were \$1,000,000 less than this amount. The figures suggest that Canada should be able to increase her fish exports to Italy from their present modest total of \$13,743.

It is proposed to run a line of freight boats on regular schedule between Canada and ports along the Mediterranean, stopping at all the important points from Barcelona to Smyrna; and if this is acted on Canada's sales to the lands served by those ports ought to grow very rapidly.

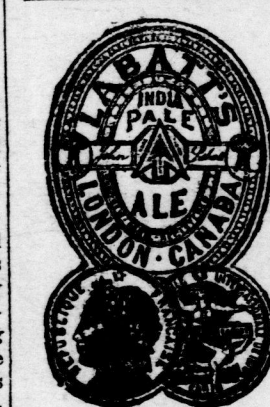
