RECORD PRODUCTION PLANNED BY FARMERS AROUND AILSA CRAIG

Splendid Response Will Be Made to Help Allies Win.

AILSA CRAIG, April 12.-After a most successful season of syrupmaking, which lasted several weeks, the farmers in this district are all busy seeding, and have had a good week, as the weather was fine and dry, making the land in splendid condition. The soil is working up very dition. The soil is working up very easily, though pipes down in the ground, some five and eight feet deep, are still frozen up, and the farmers cannot quite understand how the land is in such good shape when such heavy frosts prevailed and so little wet weather.

The fall wheat is in fairly good condition, but needs another nice warm rain. The roads all over were never better for this time of the year, and the farmers say so far prospects are good for a most wonderful year's crop.

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The flax mill has finished scutching the 1917 crop, and have commenced seeding for this year. The manager for the Standard Flax Company here, Dan McKellar, states in all his years' experiences the earliest to start seeding was the 12th of April, but this year they started on their 500 acres April 1, and so far have not lost a day. There have been 15 men employed all winter in the mill, but will require more help next winter, as last year only 300 acres was put in flax. The land around here cannot be beaten for flax growing.

A big cattle season is also expected in this district, as drovers are having more stock and extra land for grazing. One cattle dealer here has 300 head cn 1,500 acres, and there are ten other big cattle dealers who average about the same number, besides others who do not go quite so heavily into the business. This all sounds, as though this district intends doing their share to win the war, and which means a lot in the producting line.

EXETER COMMITTEE TO ASSIST FARMERS

EXETER, April 12.—A resources committee comprised of representatives from Exeter and vicinity has been formed to help the farmers of the district in solving the big problem of labor shortage this season. The farmers are willing to boost greater production in every way possible, but many will be limited by lack of help, and it is to help them remedy this that the committee is co-operating.

The syrup season which has just ended was most successful all through this district. Some farmers had as high as 250 trees tapped. They are finding a ready sale for the syrup.
