TOUCH NEW LOW
MARK IN WEST**

Quotations Decline 10 to 12 Cents a Bushel For Future Delivery.

FLOUR RECEDES ALSO

Drop of 60 Cents a Barrel Reported by Two Mills—Low Figure \$11.30.

CHICAGO, Oct. 4.—Wheat futures declined 10 to 12 c a bushel today in the principal grain markets of the West, in some cases touching low levels not before reached since the United States Government established the war-time wheat price.

December deliveries closed in Chicago at \$1.15 1/2, at St. Louis \$1.15 1/4, and at Kansas City, a lower level was reached in \$1.11. At Minneapolis the December option closed at an even \$2, a drop of a drop of 11 1/2 c from Saturday.

March options closed: At Chicago, \$1.17 1/2; at St. Louis, \$1.17 1/4; at Minneapolis, \$1.15.

Declines in wheat were reflected in new flour quotations from Minneapolis, where quotations of 60 c a barrel since Friday were reported by two mills, bringing flour to \$11.50 to \$11.55 a barrel, in quarter-barrel sacks. Corn and oats likewise touched new low levels, equaling quotations of 1915 and 1917 for the December options. December corn closed today in Chicago at 85 1/2 c, compared with \$1.21 six weeks ago and \$1.15 in July, 1915. Cash corn at that time reached \$1.15. Oats established new low records in both the December and the May delivery, closing at 30 cents and 30 cents on the Chicago Board. In May of this year May options went as high as \$1.05.

Lack of export demand and free Canadian offerings were given as causes of the decline in wheat, and corn and oats are reflecting the wheat situation.

**MOTHERS' PENSION
BOARD ANNOUNCES
TEMPORARY RATES**

Widow With Five Children To Receive \$55 a Month.

TORONTO, Oct. 4.—The Ontario Mothers' Pension Board has adopted the following temporary flat rate. Widow with five or more children, \$55 per month; widow with four or more children, \$50 per month; widow with three or more children, \$45 per month; widow with two or more children, \$40 per month.

Country: Widow with five or more children, \$45 per month; widow with four or more children, \$40 per month; widow with three or more children, \$35 per month; widow with two or more children, \$30 per month.

About 1,000 applications for mothers' allowances have been received by the pension board. The principle of the act is that the allowances paid to those women eligible under its provisions shall be sufficient to enable the mothers to provide proper home life, proper food and proper clothing for their children.

Before the commission can accomplish its ends local boards must be appointed, the applications for allowances passed upon by them, the reports of the investigators received and the amount of the allowance to be paid decided upon by the commission.

**FOCH IS PROUD OF
HAVING COMMANDED
CANADIAN CAVALRY**

French Field Marshal Writes To Seeley Praising Its Work.

TORONTO, Oct. 4.—Admiration and pride for the Canadian cavalry brigade is expressed by Field Marshal Foch in a letter to Major-General Seeley, which the latter gave out for publication today. The letter follows: "I have been regretting having had to be away from Paris for some time and for not having been able to reply to your letter before your departure for Canada. Nevertheless, I hope my answer will reach you still in time, so that you will be able to make use of it during your visit to your former comrades."

"I do not forget the heroism of the Canadian cavalry brigade. In the month of March, 1918, the war was at the gates of Amiens. It was vital at all hazards for us to maintain at any price the close union between the two armies (British and French). On March 20, at Moreuil, and on April 1, at Hangard-en-Bantere, your brigade succeeded, by its magnificent performance, and, in unimpaired dash, in first checking the enemy and finally breaking down his spirit of attack."

"In the highest degree, thanks to your brigade, the situation, agonizing as it had been at the opening of the battle, was restored."

"Please be my interpreter to your valiant old comrades-in-arms of the Canadian cavalry brigade, in telling them of my admiration for them and expressing to them my pride at having had them under my command."

**SARNIA LAD THROWN
UNDER HEAVY WAGON
INSTANTLY KILLED**

Pedal of Bicycle Struck Curb—Inquest May Be Ordered.

SARNIA, Oct. 4.—Fourteen-year-old Douglas Tobin, son of Mrs. I. M. Tobin, 121 Vidal street, north, was instantly killed late this afternoon, when he was thrown under the wheels of a heavy wagon as the result of colliding with the wagon while riding his bicycle. The lad was employed delivering messages, and it is thought he was hurrying in order to get home in time for supper. Witnesses of the accident state that the lad turned toward the sidewalk to pass the wagon, and that the pedal of his bicycle struck the curb, throwing him under the wagon, the wheels of which passed over him before the driver could bring his team to a standstill. It is expected that an inquest will be held.

**INJUNCTION
AGAINST GAS
CO. ORDERED**

Chatham City Council Takes Offensive in Natural Gas Fight.

CHATHAM, Oct. 4.—The city council tonight authorized the gas and fuel committee to instruct City Solicitor O. L. Lewis, K.C., to issue an injunction restraining the Chatham Gas Company from raising their gas rates and to take any other steps deemed necessary. This action followed reading of a communication from the city solicitor, in which he expressed the opinion that the company was not justified in increasing the rates without making application to the Ontario Railway Board, and also that the Chatham Gas Company should compel the Union Natural Gas Company to fulfill terms of the agreement with the local company.

WILL FILL VACANCIES SOON.

OTTAWA, Oct. 4.—Six vacancies in the Senate are expected to be filled shortly. The vacancies are divided among the provinces as follows: Ontario, two; Quebec, one; Nova Scotia, one; British Columbia, one; Alberta, one.
