

"The Eskimos are very docile and extremely simple. They live almost entirely for food and clothing. They believe in reincarnation. Consequently, they never spank a child, feeling that perhaps they may be chastizing the spirit of a respected grandparent. When they grow too old to hunt or fish and feel ready to depart to the happy hunting ground, a son or near relative is selected to send them there by whatever method they choose.

"As to the morals of the Eskimos," continued Mrs. Cameron, "when a couple reach 16 or 18 years they just wander off and consider themselves married. They set up housekeeping Igloos.' Should the father of the establishment tire of this arrangement, he just naturally goes away."

Ishment tire of this arrangement, he just naturally goes away.

"One of the growing industries among these people is that of reindeer breeding. The Canadian Government, with Stefangson, the famous Arctic explorer, is endeavoring to send reindeer meat over the world to solve the meat problem. Reindeer meat is very clean, as these animals eat nothing but Iceland moss. It tastes very much like beefsteak.

"One of the peculiarities of the Eskimos," Mrs. Cameron says, "is that brides are selected principally because of the condition of their teeth. This is because women are expected to chew leather for moccasins and also to soften skins.

"Movies are shown in Alaska, but fortunately they are not greatly patronized by the Esimos. I say, fortunately, for the reason that these peoples have a particularly opposition of the stays.


