Strong Protest Against Indignities and Class Legislation Forwarded to the Federal Authoritics.

"Whereas the requirements of pre-sent immigration laws are made to apply to all third and second-class passengers coming into Canada from Great Britain and Europe, without regard to former residence, thus class-ing returning Canadian citizens as immigrants, and requiring them to submit to medical examination and educational tests the same as incom-

ing immigrants; "And whereas these tests are not required of saloon passengers, who, by the payment of a higher rate, are practically exempt from the above-named

tically exempt from the above-named tests; "Therefore, be it resolved that we, whose names are signed below, do strongly protest against these prac-tices as class legislation, as, on the one hand, humiliating to returning Canadians who have been traveling abroad and choose to return as second cabin passengers, and, on the other hand, as altogether inadequate to pro-tect our country from physical and tect our country from physical and moral degenerates, who, by the pay-ment of a few dollars, escape the tests

ment of a few dollars, escape the tests required of other passengers.
