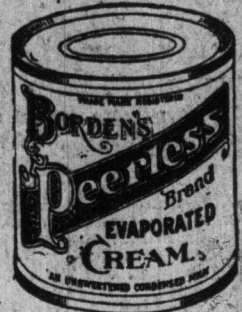

CUT ESTIMATES \$200,000 TO EXCISE TAX RATES

This is the Job that Faces the Controllers—Increases for Firemen

The board of control at a conference with City Treasurer Ousey yesterday afternoon learned that the civic estimates in their present shape exceed by about \$200,000 the amount necessary to give a tax rate of 18 1/2 mills. As estimates now stand it would be necessary to make the rate 19 1/2 mills, but the mayor is determined that there shall be no advance.

The board is well satisfied with the result of the first draft, which comes closest to the desired rate than usual for initial drafts. They will start another draft today and will have the estimates ready for the council meeting March 8.

Firemen's Salaries.
The board of control yesterday made the important change in the civic salary grading scheme of making the salary of first year firemen start at \$525, with an annual increase of \$100 each to a maximum of \$925 after five years' service. The board also fixed the maximum salary of lieutenants at \$975 and of captains at \$1100. The maximum salary of the board's secretary was increased from \$2200 to \$2500.

Mayor Oliver strongly opposed creating a supervised playground in Moss Park Square against the wishes of owners of adjacent property, and even hinted he might apply for an injunction. The parks committee's recommendation was, however, sent to the trustees of Massey Hall regarding the building of a hall from taxation on consideration that concerts be given at popular prices.

The board decided to send Controllers Hocken and Geary to ask the Whitney Government to contribute to the beautifying of Toronto, following the example of the Dominion Government at Ottawa.

Local Interest in Archaeology.

The taste of Toronto for art and archaeology has been fostered of late by an interesting series of events. The formation of an Archaeological Society under the presidency of E. R. Oiler, M.P., the meeting at the University of Toronto of the Archaeological Institute of America; the visit of its lecturers, Professors Carroll of Washington, Kellogg of Michigan, and Moore of Harvard; the opening of the Archaeological Exhibition at Wycliffe College by His Excellency the Governor-General have all contributed to this end. As a climax comes the lecture this afternoon in the university course, of Charles T. Curran, the eminent explorer and curator of the university Archaeological Museum. His lecture on "Primitive Art of Egypt" will be illustrated by stereoscopic views and selected specimens from his recent acquisitions in Egypt and the Sahara.
