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BAPTIST PASTOR RESIGNS DIDN'T WANT NEW CHURCH

Rev. Hugh McDiarmid Says the Undertaking Would Cripple Work of Church For Years

HAMILTON, June 13.—(Special.)—Rev. Hugh McDiarmid this evening resigned the pastorate of the Herdmer street Baptist Church, to take effect Sept. 15. He said his reason for the step was that a majority of the board was in favor of building a new church, and he declined to lead in an enterprise so expensive and which would cripple the work of the church for years. He admitted that there were other points of difference, but said they could have been adjusted. One difficulty is said to be over a promised increase in the pastor's salary.

LEAVE TO GO TO CAMP

Government's Concession to Militiamen in Outside Civil Service.

OTTAWA, June 13.—(Special.)—The following will be the dates of competitive practice at Petawawa camp for field artillery brigades and heavy regiments of Canadian artillery: Field Batteries: 4th battery, 2nd brigade, Hamilton, July 21, 22; 7th battery, 2nd brigade, St. Catharines, July 21, 22; 8th battery, 2nd brigade, Toronto, July 25-28; 9th battery, Deseronto, July 28-30; 10th battery, Cobourg, Aug. 16-18; 6th battery, Montreal, Aug. 15-20; 7th battery, Montreal, Aug. 23-25; 1st brigade, Guelph, Aug. 25-27; 6th battery, London, Aug. 30-Sept. 1; Cobourg company, Aug. 9-12. Field and Cavalry Ambulances will proceed to camp with full establishment, except the heavier division, which will not train. The authorized establishment will also be short one ambulance wagon, and its corresponding number of horses.

Leave of absence has been granted to all permanent employees of the outside civil service throughout the Dominion to proceed to camp to undergo annual training with the corps to which they belong, and that such leave shall not be reckoned as annual leave.

ALEXANDRA SCHOOL HOLDS ANNUAL MEETING

All Reports Are Gratifying—Darling Attack at Balm Beach—County News

The annual meeting of the Alexandra Industrial School, held in East Toronto on the beautiful grounds of the institution on Saturday afternoon, was in all respects one of the most gratifying in its long history. The weather was ideal, tempting scores of citizens not hitherto in close touch with this worthy institution, to run out and observe at close range the splendid work being carried out by the allied provincial, city and county authorities, coupled with the janitor-tested work of many philanthropic people. A large marquee erected on the lawn was utilized for speaking and concert purposes, and here following the presentation of the several reports the pupils of the school and others received the directors, the distinguished Hon. Lieut.-Governor Gibson, accompanied by Mrs. Gibson, drove out during the afternoon and were received by the directors, the cadets of the Victoria Industrial School playing the national anthem.

Control Hocken was in the chair and the lieutenant-governor, who had left early on the afternoon, spoke briefly. "I refer with pride and gratification to the fact," said he, "that it was during my occupancy of the position of provincial secretary that the grant to this worthy institution was first made. The Alexandra Industrial School has more than justified its existence in the splendid work done during these years. His honor warmly complimented the superintendent, Miss Parrot, on the insignificant work being carried out under her own direct supervision, and referred in the kindest terms to the excellent deportment and appearance of the girls of the institution.

Miss Parrot's report, submitted later, was a voluminous document, dealing with every phase of the work. Superintendent Ferrer of the Victoria Industrial School likewise submitted the report of that institution. His references to the success attending the efforts to teach the boys useful trades was especially satisfactory. In the Alexandra Industrial School during the year 60 girls from 29 municipalities were admitted, of an average age, while 60 girls left during the year, being placed in good situations. Cooking, dressmaking, fancy work, and all the good uses of the accomplishments are taught, and some of the pupils are splendid examples of the success attained in music and elocution.

For 25 years Beverly Jones has been the indefatigable friend and treasurer of the Ladies' Aid of the Reservoir Park, on Saturday afternoon, and he presented a report, submitted on Saturday afternoon, which was in all respects one of the most satisfactory. It showed in brief total assets of \$68,871.98, with total receipts during the year of \$119,444, including municipal and provincial, and other grants. The expenses were nominally \$60,000, which includes permanent improvements, leaving a small balance.

Chief Inspector Archibald, Aid. Breddin, Aid. McKillop, Aid. Graham, Hon. S. C. Briggs, Rev. J. Neil, and Inspector Chapman spoke briefly.

The several boards of management of last year were re-elected. Following the business meeting luncheon was served, and the visitors shown over the grounds.
