N.Y.C. RY. STOCK ISSUE Public Service Commission Lays Down Certain Restrictions and

AIBANY, N.Y., Nov. 22 .- The public service commission, second district, has authorized the New York Central and Hudson River Company to issue 446,-580 shares of its capital stock of the total par value of \$44,658,000. The stock is to be sold at par, in conformity with a resolution recently adopted by the board of directors.

Demands Monthly Reports.

Of the proceeds of the sale of stock, \$21,966,615.48 is to be used for the discharge of certain three year five per-cent. gold notes of the company, maturing Feb. 10, 1910, the total am principal of the notes being \$25,-

The company is not allowed under the order to use any part of the proceeds for the discharge of the remaining part of the principal of these notes, but the commission find that the \$3,033,384.53 is not properly chargeable

The company is to use the remainder of the proceeds, \$22,691,384.52 for the acquisition of property and for the extension and improvement of its facilities acording to a schedule filed with the commission. Not more than \$5,000,-000 is to be used for the purchase of new equipment and rolling stock. The company is required to make monthly reports of its stock cales and

must account for its expenditures. Within thirty days after the payment of the gold notes, the company must file with the commission a verified re-port showing the amounts and dates when paid:
