EARL GREY A PLEADER FOR THE RURAL LIFE Cost of Living Increasing Because Two Many Are Leaving The Farm.

AMHERST, N. S., Dec. 6.—(Special.)—The ninth Maritime Winter Fair opened here to-day. The entries in all classes far surpassed those of any previous year. Continued From Page 1. No country in the world was suffering from so great a disadvantage as Canada in the supply of skilled labor. It was a surprise to him how the large companies, especially the railways, had managed to obtain a sufficient supply of skilled labor. The greatest percentage of accidents in the world in operating coal mines was in Canada, and British Columbia was the worst of the provinces in this respect. Men without training had been imported into these enterprises, there being a difficulty in getting skilled men.

L. P. Brodeur, Hon. J. M. Hughes, Hon. J. B. Macdonald, Hon. John Haggart and George Taylor.

WILLING TO MERGE. MONTREAL, Dec. 6.—(Special.)—Up to to-day, holders of 22,000 shares of Dominion Coal stock had agreed to go into the merger, while only 817 shares were asked for the \$50 offer made to Mr. Ross.

TO EXAMINE HOUSE RULES (Continued). The government had in the past spent millions of money on things which came under the jurisdiction of the provinces. How could a grant of money in aid of this proposal offer from a grant for a local undertaking? Parliament had the right to vote money in aid of any scheme which it deemed proper. This government had asked for industrial exhibitions, art schools, lectures on the metric system, McGill University, the education of masters and mates of vessels, and for experimental farms. They knew the needs for technical education, for Canada was the worst-off country in that regard.

Mr. Guthrie replied, saying that if Mr. King meant by his amendment that the question of technical education was to be shelved, he would be compelled to vote for his resolution. Or a vote being taken Mr. King's amendment was carried by 73 yeas to 56, a majority of 23. Messrs. Guthrie, Gerville and Fowke voted against the government.




SHORT STORIES. CHICAGO, Dec. 6.—Ban Johnson, president of the American Baseball League, tonight declared that the American League owners would be a unit at the New York meeting next week for a short season schedule and shorter games. He said: "We shall try to do away with the custom of letting the pitcher throw four practice balls to the catcher, unless the pitcher has just been at bat. I am in favor of making the schedule of games as short as possible. Last year seven of the American League owners were in favor of 147 games, while the eighth wanted 154 games. The American League was really all for 140 games, but for harmony's sake and to save muddling up the schedule we compromised on 145 games. In the coming year we want a shorter schedule."

HEARD EVIDENCE 3 MONTHS, (Continued). The cases originated in a report of the finance commission more than two years ago, charging that the city had been defrauded of many thousands of dollars in the acceptance of bids for the steel work from parties who were alleged to be in collusion. The grand jury indicted 34 firms and individuals, but during the trial 19 of the defendants were found not guilty by order of the court.
