Biggest Crowd of Season

DUMA MEMBERS WANT  
SOLDIER ASSURANCES

Russian Advanced Liberals and Reformers Fear Speedy Dis-solution of Chamber.

APPLAUD VISIT OF CZAR

Scepticism Publicly Expressed Regarding Closer Working of Government With People.

PETROGRAD, via London, Feb. 23.—The optimistic sentiments awakened by yesterday's historic opening of the duma are not entirely shared by various Liberal and Progressive members who have publicly expressed scepticism regarding the government's announced intention to work in close touch with the people.

The emperor's visit to the chamber is universally applauded by all factions "for its moral effect upon the army, the people, Russia and the enemy," but the Liberal faction in the duma is inclined to wait "for the government by declaring the session, and to work together with the representatives of the people."

One of the most emphatic expressions of opinion was made in the duma meeting by M. Gichinsky in the name of the Progressives.

"The majority in the duma," said M. Schudovsky, "once more persistently points out that the danger threatening the country is by no means past. Means for fighting this danger cannot be made, and the way to such a solution is a sincere appeal to the masses of the Russian people, not only by words, but by deeds—in the way that was shown by the majority in the duma half year ago."
