

Russian Advanced Liberals and Reformers Fear Speedy Dissolution of Chamber.

### APPLAUD VISIT OF CZAR

Scepticism Publicly Expressed Regarding Closer Working of Government With People.

PETROGRAD, via London, Feb. 23.

The optimistic sentiments awakened by yesterday's historic opening of the duma are not entirely shared by various Liberal and Progressive members, who have publicly expressed scepticism regarding the government's announced intention to work in close:

announced intention to work in close: concert with the people.

The emperor's visit to the chamber is universally applauded by all factions "for its moral effect upon the army, the people, Russia's allies and the enemy," but the Liberal faction in the duma is inclined to wait "for the government by deed to show its wish to work together with the representatives of the people." LONDON, Feb. 22.—The Turks lost heavily in the fighting resulting in the capture of Erzerum by the Russians, according to a Petrograd despatch today, which estimates their losses as 40,000 killed, wounded and prisoners.

BALFOUR FOUND DEAD. Former British M.P. Served Prison Term After Big Fallure.


