The city council will be asked on Monday to support a move from the board of control to adopt a new method of financing the laying of water mains in front of vacant lots. water mains in front of vacant lots. The present rule is to oblige the parties making application for the main to sign a bond guaranteeing an annual payment to the city sufficient to cover the interest and sinking fund charges on the cost of laying the main in addition to the ordinary water rates until the annual revenue from the main equals 10 per cent. of the total cost. Under this rule the applicants bear the whole burden of having the main extended, altho the extension may pass other vacant lots and thus increase their value. The amendment calls for the laying of the main or
