FITZ'S SINGLE TURNED TRICK LEAFS BEAT JAWN'S HUSTLERS

In the Morning Game Rochester Caught Leafs in the Eighth, But Kelley's Klouters Came Thru With the Needed Run in the Last Round

ROCHESTER, N. Y., May 30.—After losing two tough games to the Hustlers on the ninth inning rallies, the Leafs went in today to get revenge. Two of the Leafs, Sullivan and Plick, are hardly able to play, suffering with Charley-horses. Today is a national holiday, Memorial Day, in which the civil war dead are commemorated.
