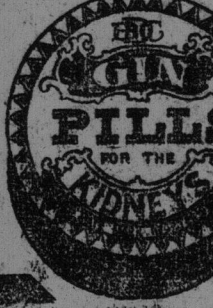

Understood He Will be Delegate to Congress of Chambers of Commerce of the Empire in September.
It is understood that James Pender will be the other delegate with W. Frank Hatheway, M. P., from the St. John Board of Trade to the meeting of the Chambers of Commerce of the Empire which will open on September 14 in Sydney, Australia. When asked about the matter last evening, Mr. Pender said that he was rather early to make any definite statement as to his plans but he had practically decided to make the trip.

By sailing from Vancouver on August 13 he would arrive in time for the conference and, after paying a visit to his brothers, John and William, who were in business in Melbourne, would be home again in November. Mr. Pender's brothers are well known in St. John. They have twice visited the city since making their homes in Australia. John Pender left St. John first in 1882 and his brother, William, followed him to the Antipodes two years later. They are engaged in the horsehoe nail business in a suburb of Melbourne.

AN EX-SPOTTER UNDER ARREST

Fred McQuestion Who Figured in Fredericton Liquor Prosecutions Charged With Robbery at Loggieville
Chatham, N. B., June 15.—Within the next twenty-four hours the police and detective working on the Loggieville robbery case expect to make another arrest in addition to the apprehension of Fred McQuestion alias Brownell, now in custody at Newcastle.

O'Leary & Montgomery's general store was broken into about three weeks ago and about \$300 worth of goods taken, and during the last few days the local police have been assisted in tracing the thieves by J. J. Little of the Third Detective service of Montreal. With Chief Lawson and Policeman Morris, Detective Little went down river last night, and McQuestion was arrested at 3:30 o'clock this morning at the home of Alex. McGrath. In his trunk were found a number of articles afterwards identified by R. H. M. Gilchrist as being in the store before the robbery, and concerning the possession of which the prisoner told conflicting stories.

McQuestion was working in Fredericton in connection with Robert Belyea, Scott Act spotter, and has been in Loggieville since the robbery. He has followed watch making, peddling, book agent, and seems to be intelligent and well educated. He gave the police a full and frank account of the robbery, and the police believe that there are others implicated in the theft and promise sensational developments before morning. The heavy rain so eagerly looked for came last night between 11 and 12 o'clock, and the fires are completely drenched out. Ladore Sabany, whose attempts to commit suicide, whether real or pretended, created such a sensation, was given his liberty yesterday afternoon on the testimony of his wife, that he had been drinking heavily.

FIREMEN PAID WELL FOR THE POSITIONS

Bribery and Corruption in Montreal Department.
Montreal, June 15.—As the royal commission into Montreal's civil administration delves deeper into the unwholesome mess some astounding evidence is being brought out.

Tales of bribery and corruption in the Montreal fire department were continued this afternoon. Fireman after fireman entered the witness box and in answer to the probing of the attorneys, Messrs. Perron and LaFlamme, told of holdups for money not only when they wanted promotions, but when they first desired to enter the brigade.

One fireman swore to having paid \$250 to get his son into the brigade. Another said he had given \$500 which he had saved up in order to enter the service, when he could find no other work. More significant still, Foreman Larivee swore to having paid Captain Viau of the brigade \$500 to obtain a promotion.

Another revelation brought out during the afternoon was that Sub-Chief Marin could not read, even in French. He was shown some writing but was unable to read a single word of it. He is the man who is concerned in the evidence regarding a brokerage department in which tolls were demanded for obtaining positions.

SIR ALEXANDER LA COSTE IN THE CITY YESTERDAY

Sir Alexander LaCoste, of Montreal, and Alexandre Bievens, general manager of the Provincial Bank of Canada, Montreal, are at the Royal. They have been touring the province on pleasure and will leave on the C. P. R. this evening for St. Andrews before returning home. Sir Alexander was chief justice of Quebec for a number of years but retired from the bench three years ago. He is now a member of a prominent legal firm of Montreal. Both gentlemen said it was their first visit to New Brunswick and they were much delighted with what they had seen.

THE FIRST DRAFT OF THE METHODIST STATION SHEET

Some Important Changes Made in Which St. John Churches are Affected—Rev. James Crisp Goes to P. E. Island and Rev. Mr. Deinstadt to Shediac—New Men for Exmouth Street and Zion

Woodstock, June 15.—The 26th annual conference of the Methodist church, met here today, the first day being given up to the ministerial session. Rev. James Crisp presided at the morning session, and the president, Rev. Samuel Howard, in the afternoon. There are ninety delegates present and some thirty-five or forty more are expected to arrive tomorrow morning.

The ministerial session opened at 9 o'clock, when the ordinary questions relative to the standing of ministers and probationers were asked and satisfactorily answered.

Leave of absence was granted to Rev. Dr. George M. Campbell, for another year to continue in Bible Society work. Leave of absence was also granted to Rev. A. Lucas for another year to continue in Sunday school work.

The following transfers were announced: Rev. Ernest Fugh, from the Newfoundland conference to this; Rev. R. W. Weddall, from the Nova Scotia conference to this; Rev. J. Durrant, from Newfoundland; Rev. George M. Young, to the Nova Scotia conference; Rev. R. G. Falcon, to the British Columbia conference where he will take up the pastorate of Grace church, Vancouver. Rev. W. W. Fowler's aspiration to become a superintendent was recommended. Leon H. Jewett was recommended for ordination to the full work of the ministry.

Newcastle, Me., June 15.—The thieving propensities of a nine-year-old boy were practiced today upon Mrs. Lillian M. N. Stevens, of Portland, president of the National Woman's Christian Temperance Union, while Mrs. Stevens was delivering a lecture on temperance before several hundred children in the hall of the church here. She had laid a gold watch, chain and charm and a gold pen upon a table near which she was standing. The boy was sitting not far away and it is supposed that he edged near the table to pull the articles.

When Mrs. Stevens had finished her remarks she turned to pick up the jewelry, but it had vanished. A search of the nearby corners failed to disclose any of the articles. It was noticed, however, that the lad was missing and with a knowledge of the facts, according to his teachers, they began to hunt for him. He was found and gave up the articles.
