BOY BANDIT HOLDS UP BANK AGAIN

Endora, Kansas, Nov. 12.—Earl Bullock, a boy bandit of Lawrence, Kansas, accompanied by William McKay, fifteen years of age, of Jackson (Pa.), in an attempt today to repeat his exploit of a month ago, robbed the Endora State Bank of \$800 after shooting Fred Starr, a banker, and later probably mortally wounding himself when closely pressed by armed citizens.

In his first hold-up of the Endora State Bank, Bullock, who is seventeen years of age, shot and killed a policeman. A man officer had announced that Bullock had left the state with the loot of a previous hold-up, and McKay entered the State Bank about closing time.

Fred Starr, cashier of the Endora State Bank of Endora, who was in the State Bank with his day's earnings, stood by as the outlaws held up the State Bank's cashier, Henry Wilson. Although Starr did not resist the hold-up, Bullock shot him through the leg, snatching more than \$800, Bullock and McKay fled. Each youth had two revolvers.

THE COAL AND STEEL MERGER PROSPECTS

Montreal, Nov. 12.—The merger of the Dominion Coal Company and the Dominion Iron & Steel Company into a corporation to be known as the Canada Steel Corporation is apparently rapidly approaching completion and it is expected that it will evaporate in the near future.

During the past few days negotiations have been proceeding between E. R. Wood and Col. Sir Henry Pellatt, representing a syndicate of Toronto holders of steel and coal, and James Ross, president of the Dominion Coal Company, represented by C. H. Cahon. The arrangements, it is understood, are near a conclusion and the finishing touches will probably be added tomorrow morning.

It is stated on excellent authority that the result of these negotiations will be the passing of a portion of James Ross' \$5,000,000 holdings in the Dominion Coal Company to the proposed syndicate at a price something less than par. As soon as the transfer of this big block of coal stock is made, arrangements will be entered into for the merging of the two companies, although no basis of price has yet been reported.

RED WIDOW RECEIVES OFFERS OF MARRIAGE AND STAGE CAREER



Paris, Nov. 12.—The entire session of the Steinhilf murder case today was taken up with an impassioned plea by Advocate General Rouard Balle for the conviction of the woman who is charged with having killed her husband and her stepmother and became an inmate of the asylum.

The latter scored heavily at the conclusion of the prosecutor's address when she interrupted the proceedings, though frequently she clenched her fists and showed signs of anger when the prosecutor made particularly odious insinuations against her.

It is understood that at the conclusion of Mme. Steinhilf's address, Mme. Steinhilf intended to take advantage of the privilege accorded an accused person, and address the jury in her own behalf. This would make a dramatic climax and, it is expected, have a powerful influence on the jury which tonight is reported to be evenly divided as to her guilt or innocence.

Two things must be remembered in connection with a French verdict. First, the majority vote prevails, the foreman of the jury having two votes if there is a tie; second, the jurors are not confined but are permitted to return to their homes at night where they are subjected to the possible influence of their wives. It is notorious that whereas a majority of the men here favor the acquittal of Mme. Steinhilf, the women are practically unanimous in the belief that she is guilty.

Mme. Steinhilf is being deluged with letters of every character, many of them containing offers of marriage if she is acquitted. Enterprising theatrical managers are trying to arrange for her immediate appearance on the stage after release, one having offered \$20,000 for thirty appearances. Mme. Steinhilf is represented as having thrown these letters away in a rage.

THE TORY CAUCUS

Ottawa, Nov. 12.—The Conservatives in caucus today sat for two hours and a half in the morning and for most of the evening and finally separated without reconciling their differences on the naval policy. The west is still for Dreadnaughts. Mr. Borden is still with the government and P. D. Monk gave expression to the view by staying away.

The final conclusion was that as they could not agree among themselves the best policy would be to stop talking for a time and wait until the government programme was finally laid before parliament.

BOTH BOURASSA CANDIDATES LOSE

Montreal, Nov. 12.—The result of today's by-elections in the Province of Quebec with the election of two straight government supporters and one defeat in Quebec city, is regarded as a strong answer to the campaign of Henri Bourassa in criticism of the policy of Premier Gouin.

The fight was mainly centralized on St. James division of Montreal, where a strong campaign was waged mainly on personal issues. Mr. Lafamme, the Nationalist candidate, was supported by Bourassa and J. B. Poirer, ex-minister of mines and forests in the Gouin government, and the fight was largely concentrated on municipal lines. The Nationalist candidate, Mr. Lafamme, was defeated by 268 by the straight government supporter, Ald. Robitaille.
