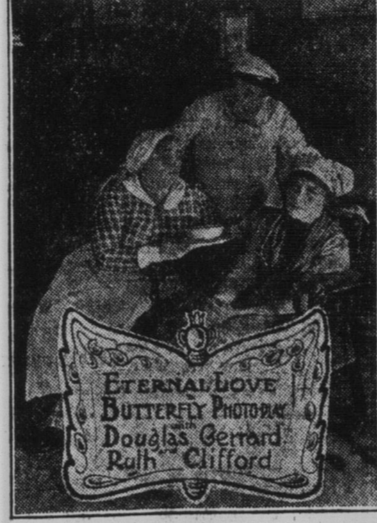

NEWS OF PROMINENT BAPTISTS

A. J. Jeffries, a recruit for the ministry licensed by the West End church, Halifax, has accepted a call to Rawdon.

Rev. G. D. Hudson of Lower Aylesford, has been called to the pastorate of the Aylesford church. His resignation at Lower Aylesford was received with much regret.

Rev. W. H. Jenkins, recently of Ohio has been removed to Kempsville in the same county. Rev. E. Crowell, D.D., has been called to Northampton since the resignation of Pastor Jenkins.

Rev. Arthur S. Burrows has closed his pastorate at the Emmanuel Baptist church of Cambridge, Mass., after nearly five years of service there. At a farewell reception the year made recipient of a purse of \$100.

L. G. Fischer, who has been teaching for two or three years, will begin work soon as a preacher. It is expected that he will begin his pastoral work at St. Margaret's Bay Second church of Haverhill.

Among the graduates of the New-Newton Theological Institute this year are several who received their college training at Acadia. Of these, G. A. S. Howe became pastor of the Berean Temple, Dorchester, Mass.; C. L. Fennell settled at North Billerica; Ross C. Eaton goes to Mansfield; Carlton Easton will minister to the South Christian church of Haverhill.

Rev. A. E. Wheeler has accepted a call to Summerside. His work at Halifax will close in August.

We have just received word of the death of Mrs. J. S. McFadden of Andover, who passed away Saturday morning after a short illness of pneumonia. Thus a life of great promise and usefulness is cut short.

Miss Edith Kathleen Rutledge, daughter of Rev. J. W. Rutledge, formerly of these provinces, was graduated on June 21 from the Girls' Latin School of Boston, being awarded the "Ellen C. Griswold" scholarship on the ground of scholarship and character.

Rev. Archibald Mason closed his work at Macquarie, N.B., on the 22nd Sunday in June. On the following Tuesday evening a large company gathered for a farewell reception at the home of Avarad Currie.

Among the recent enlistments we note the name of Karl Bishop, son of Rev. F. E. Bishop, who has joined the 10th Siege Battery, at Halifax. He finished the work of Grade XII in the Halifax County Academy last week and on Saturday began his military duties.

Following an address by Rev. Arthur C. Archibald, of the First church, Lowell, delivered at the Northern Baptist convention, at Cleveland, on "Lay Evangelism and the Coming of the Kingdom," the audience of nearly 1,000 ministers present, by a standing vote requested the Home Mission Society to ask Mr. Archibald to relinquish his pastorate and spend the next few years in speaking before the state conventions and ministers' conferences in promoting lay evangelism.

His church at Lowell being unwilling to release him, he has decided to devote the months of October to this purpose.

HARDEN WRITES SOME THINGS THAT GERMANS WILL REGRET TO READ

London, July 4.—The Times reports that Maximilian Harden devoted the whole Zukunft of June 16 to an article called "The Stockholm Mystery." The gist of his argument is that, in view of the uncertain prospects at Stockholm and the uncertainty of success in the game that Germany has thus far played in Russia, the time is approaching for Germany to throw some concessions into the discussion about Poland and Alsace-Lorraine.

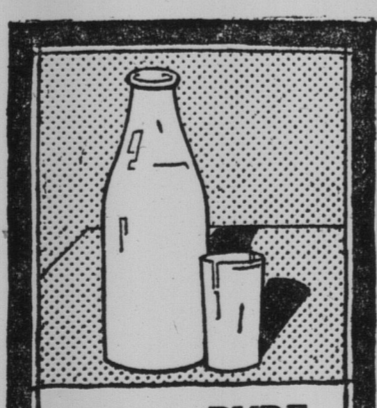
Harden eulogizes President Wilson and proceeds to discuss the "childish distortion of President Wilson's message to Russia by the German press, and proceeds to discuss the principles of the American attitude, which he says have remained unchanged."

"Special effect upon the Russians is no doubt expected from the sentences that give warning against being guided by a desire for applause, against being in the line of the German yearning for freedom, which serves only as a mask, and against failing to understand that the Berlin government in its fear of menacing disaster is using an international intermediary to understand to which it itself has always denied the minimum of tolerance and justice, and which future would be imperilled and perhaps destroyed by the victory of autocracy; and the July sun will doubtless proclaim their resolution to the most powerful exhibition of western art, will convert the Russian committee."

Harden then observes that only the Russian proposal of a socialist congress retains any importance, and he declares that if the congress does not meet, "unity of front against Germany will be secured more firmly than ever before."

He observes further, that if the socialist congress were still to meet, the object of the western powers, "and of certain neutrals," would be to turn the Russian committee against the Germans by showing that the German attitude is impossible, and that even the conclusion of a separate peace by Russia "would no longer dishearten the British Empire, North and South America, France, Italy, Australia, Africa and their half-grown hangers-on."

Harden concludes: "All our enemies and all Slavs are in favor of the unification of the three pieces of the Polish realm. In the thirty-fifth month of the war, America, England and France, loudly proclaim their resolution to go on fighting until Alsace-Lorraine, if its majority desires it, has again become French. Ideas can be defeated only by ideas, and never by bowitzers and torpedoes. Instead of dreaming of a Stockholm miracle, think out a work-picture which will win souls for a peace in the making of which Germany will have her share. Miracles only happen when love in its holy strength is sanctified by the creative spirit of humanity."
