proaches and communication lines in full view of the enemy. Even when they reached the plateau the situation was still difficult, for they found themselves in a country where everything, even water, must be brought up with great physical exertion.

"The Italians now for the first time have gained a position where they dominate the Austrians. But the advance is still difficult and the country is too difficult to expect a sudden dramatic success. Progress will be slow, but success will come."

"I regard the Italian crossing of the Isonzo, which led to the occupation of the Dolomite plateau, as a feat which will forever rank as one of the great feats in the history of warfare."

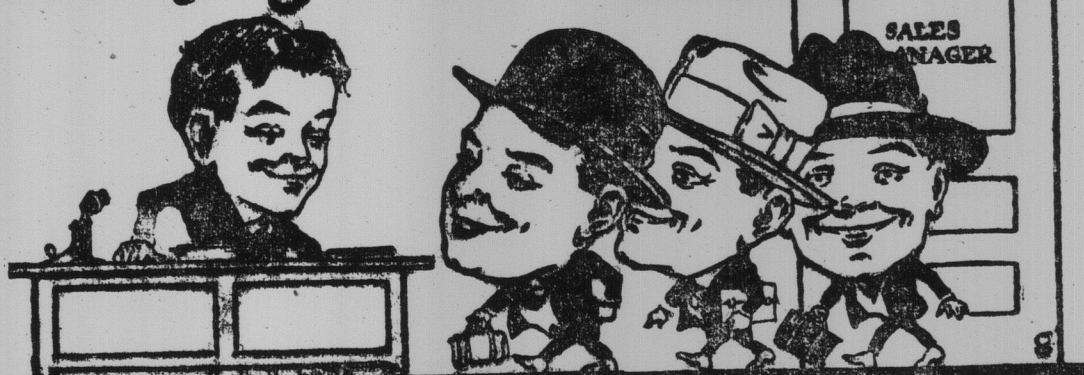

CANADIAN DEVICE TO MEET U-BOATS

Major Douglas Hamilton Says Invention Will Make It Impossible for Germans to Sink Ships

Montreal, Sept. 28.—Major Douglas Hamilton is perfecting a device designed to make it impossible for Germany to sink ships at sea. The details are in the hands of the British and allied governments. A ship equipped with the device will be tested by torpedo fire in the near future, and Major Hamilton says he is so confident that he is willing to take a chance on the ship's experimental success. The resisting power of the device with which the ships are to be protected, is said to be 1,000 times heavier than the heaviest torpedo or other projectiles made by the enemy.
