LOCAL NEWS

CORSICAN AT MONTREAL

DR. H. C. WETMORE ILL
Dr. H. C. Wetmore, deputy receiver general of the Dominion Savings Bank, is seriously ill at his home, 81 Dorchester street. He was taken ill a week ago at his summer home in Ketepec and had to be brought to the city. He was first attacked by pleurisy and later pneumonia set in. Last night proved an especially hard one for the patient but he is reported to be somewhat improved this morning.

MUNICIPAL COUNCIL
The municipal council met this afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, in special session, Warden McElihan presiding. The business before the council included the petition of the residents of a section of Leinster for the extension of the sewerage facilities, the adoption of a new sewerage district, the authorization of a call for tenders and the award of contracts for the work of extending the system and the authorization of a bond issue to cover the cost of the work.

BUILDING NOTES

R. M. Rive of this city, general manager of the Moncton West End Building Company who was the city yesterday, reports the outlook in Moncton remarkably good. Business men there are convinced that St. John and Moncton are the most prosperous places in Canada under the present war conditions. Mr. Rive's company is showing its faith in the situation by commencing the erection of two dwellings on its property, with the prospect of more to follow. The directors of the company are A. H. Hanington and R. M. Rive of St. John, and W. F. Humphrey and Antoine Leger of Moncton.

ESTATE TO FAMILY AND TO CHARITY

Will of Wm. H. Coleman Provides For the Carrying on of His Business

In the probate court today the will of William Henry Coleman, restaurant keeper, was presented. He gives to John Durbin, his clerk, all his property in trust to pay—first, to his step-daughter, Dorothy E. Cameron, the interest of \$750 in the Royal Bank, and so much of the principal as he may see fit from time to time until she attains the age of twenty-five years, when the principal or so much thereof as may be left shall be paid to her; secondly, to continue to conduct his lunch cart business in St. John and Halifax until his said step-daughter attains such age or until the death of his wife, Emma, whichever shall last happen. Out of the proceeds thereof he is to pay to his wife each week forty per cent, to retain for himself thirty per cent in full of all remuneration, and to pay to the said step-daughter twenty per cent. The balance is to be deposited in a fund in the Royal Bank of Canada for the benefit of his said step-daughter, and on her attaining the age of twenty-five years to be paid to her.

He gives to his wife his furniture and personal effects. Out of the amount on deposit in the Dominion Savings Bank, \$500, and in the Bank of British North America, \$750, he directs that there be paid his funeral and testamentary expenses and the cost of a lot in the new Catholic cemetery, St. John, where he desires to be buried; the balance to be divided equally—one-half to his Mother Patrick for the purposes of the Saint John Infirmary in Coburg street—the other one-half to the Roman Catholic Bishop of Saint John for religious purposes.

All the rest of his estate, after the erection of a suitable monument, he directs shall go to the treasurer of the Saint Vincent de Paul Society of the Cathedral Parish, St. John, for the aid of the poor under the care of the society. There is no real estate, personally \$1,000, MacBae, Sinclair & MacBae are executors.
